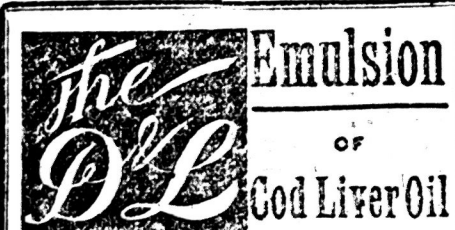

What Haldimand's Representative Had To Say About the Leadership.

[From Haldimand.]

MR. MONTAGUE. I did not intend to say anything in this debate had it not been, as the hon. member for Selkirk (Mr. Daly) has said, that the religious phase of the question was introduced by hon. gentlemen on the other side of the House. But coming as I do, and coming almost alone as I do, from one of the greater portions of the Province of Ontario, I wish to say a few words, and these few words will be for the purpose of telling my French and Catholic fellow-citizens, and my fellow-members in this House, that the stigma which is sought by any member or members to be placed upon the Conservative Protestants of Ontario is as untrue as it is undignified, and as unbecoming as it is unkind. I come from a portion of the Province of Ontario which, at the present time, I am sorry to say, is largely represented in this House by gentlemen who see fit to hold political views different from those entertained on this side of the House. The population of that district is largely a Protestant population. It is true we have a large number of Catholics in the district, but the Protestant population is in the great majority, and coming from that district, and having had communication with a large number of the leading Conservatives, some of the most prominent Conservatives in the Province of Ontario, I may say to the House to-night, and I believe they will accept my word on that point, that I have written assurances in my desk and under my hand from these leading Conservatives, that had either a French Canadian leader or an English Catholic leader been chosen to form the Government of this country, there would have been no more loyal supporters of him in the whole Dominion of Canada than those men who, although differing from such a leader in matters of church, would still look upon him and regard him for his ability and patriotism and for his position as a statesman of this country. I have no hesitation in saying that we are not bigots, I have no hesitation in saying that we are as broad-minded, that we are as liberal, that we are as fair-spirited as hon. gentlemen on the other side of the House. I re-echo the sentiments expressed by both sides of the House, that I hope the day has not come and I hope the day never will come in these ranks which followed once the great leader who is now gone, when we will reject any man because he happens to worship at another altar than that at which the majority of the people of Ontario worship at the present time. I do not intend to enter into a lengthy discussion on this question, but, as I said at the beginning of my remarks, coming as I do almost alone from that section of Ontario which is largely a Protestant section, I say that it is not the man or it is not the church that we consider, but it is the principles of public policy which he holds, it is his ability, it is his respectable character, and it is his eminence and standing as a Canadian which will cause us to accept the leader of the Government in the present or in the future. I state here that whether the man chosen to lead the Government of this country be Sir Hector Langevin or Sir John Thompson or the Hon. Mr. Abbott, be he fitted for the place as these men and others are, we will rally around him to preserve that policy which the old man who has gone inaugurated and which I trust this country will pursue for many years to come.

Too Much Married.

A. Riley has embarked on the matrimonial sea no less than five times, and he now lies stranded in the Brantford jail. The man was arrested several days ago for drunkenness, and the fact of his various matrimonial ventures having come to the knowledge of the police, it was decided to remand him for inquiries. As a result of these it turns out that Riley has been dispensing marriage fees in an exceedingly reckless fashion. His first wife died, and since that time he has led four blushing brides to the altar, all of whom are still in the land of the living. The case came up at the police court Wednesday when a good deal of evidence was given. From this it appeared that the first nuptial knot after the decease of wife No. 1, was tied with Esther Cronk, hailing from Woodstock. On the second occasion in 1881, Mrs. Kearns, said to be a widow with two children, was united to the prisoner by the Rev. John Alexander. It is claimed that Riley was under the influence of the flowing bowl on this occasion. An Indian woman named Phoebe Vise was the third victim. He apparently soon tired of her for on November 1st, 1885, at Ottaville, he espoused wife No. 4, Miss Mary Schooley, of Delhi, Rev. Mr. Ames, a Methodist minister of that place officiating. The last venture proved a success, and Riley has not since that time indulged in any other ventures. Ezra McCrae stated that he was married at the same time as Riley wedded wife No. 2. They got their licenses together from City clerk Woodruff. Gabriel H. H. junior was present at the second marriage, and stated that he was the only sober one there besides the minister. He saw the marriage certificate. Mrs. Mary Ann Johnson knew the prisoner; on Wednesday last he came to her house to get his first wife, Esther Cronk, who did not want to go with him; witness knew the accused when he was married to Phoebe Vise. Mr. McKenzies asked the witness whether, although claiming to be a widow she was not living with another man; she replied that she was her own free agent and had no strings tied to her. The police magistrate committed the prisoner for trial to first court of competent jurisdiction. The accused is apparently about 35 years of age, and is a native of Scotland, Ontario. He is a stolid kind of a man, and apparently does not possess any points of attraction. He is a barber by trade, but passes his life in a do-nothing fashion. His fifth wife, at the close of the case, might have been seen talking to him through the bar of the lockup, whilst their youngster played around in the constable's room. There is every reason to believe that Riley has half a dozen other wives through the country, and nearly all the women with whom he has associated have themselves lived with several other men. The social degradation opened up by the case is simply appalling.

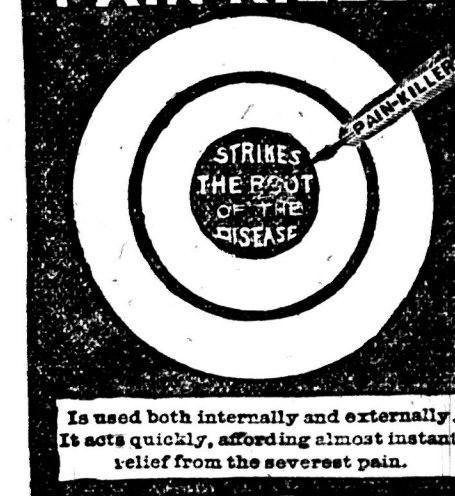
