ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

The tinplaters' union at Swansea, Wales, has decided not to strike against a reduction in wages.

It is semi-officially denied that French troops have occupied the province of Luang Prabang, a vassal state of Siam.

Prof. William Saunders, director of experimental farms in Canada, has sent in his annual report to the Minister of Agriculture.

The new Roman Catholic church in Clinton was consecrated Wednesday by Bishop O'Connor, of London, with imposing ceremonies.

The health of Mr. De Lessups has been greatly affected by the criminal proceedings instituted against the officers and directors of the panama canal.

The London Standard's Berlin correspondent says Count Von Munster denies the report that the late Emperor William had ever intended to dismiss Prince Bismarck.

The German emperor was received with great warmth at Amsterdam Wednesday, when an orchestra of nearly 1,000 performed a grand military tattoo in Dam square.

An aged man named Andrew Donovan, of Roblin, was struck Wednesday by a light engine while walking on the track near the G.T.R. depot at Napanee and is not expected to live.

Breeding for Beef.

Opinions differ as to whether it is best to wean the calves on the second day, or permit them to suckle longer. Our own idea is that it depends chiefly upon circumstances; should the cow's bag be caked or hard, it will benefit it materially if the calf is permitted to suck the cow; and again, if the calf is weakly, the same practice may with advantage be followed. On the other hand, if the calf be strong and hearty, it is often better to wean it at once. It will usually learn to drink more readily out of a pail than if permitted to suck its mother and the cow herself will more quickly forget her calf and settle down quietly. In either case the calf should be given fresh milk from the cow three times a day for a week at least—a fortnight is better; after which time the new milk may be gradually diluted with skim-milk warmed to blood heat, a handful of shorts mixed with a little flour being added to counteract the loss of the new milk until the new milk is entirely withheld. Skim-milk warmed, with a little shorts and flour and about a tablespoonful of molasses, should then be continued three times a day for about three weeks, after which it need be only given morning and night until the calf is about seven months old. The management during the early part of a calf's life is a matter of great importance, as on it much depends as to whether it will prove a remunerative feeding animal. It is at the earlier stages of existence that the greatest gain can be made in the development of frame and gain of weight for the least money, and it is easily apparent, therefore, that the calf should be pushed along and kept thriving. It is not, as we said before, essential that it should be got into show trim, but it should be kept in better order than what is often so mis-described as "growing condition." Care should be taken that no overfeeding or underfeeding should take place, for either is apt to cause a check in the improvement of the animal, an occurrence which should be cautiously avoided. As soon, then, as the calf begins to eat a little oat chop, a sprinkling of oil meal should be given, just as much as it will lick up clean, and the ration increased as the calf grows older, with pulped roots or a little grass in season and all the hay it will eat. Between seven and eight months old, the calf, if born in the fall, can be turned out to grass; and if kept as it should be, in good pasture, it will come in, in the fall in good order, which can be maintained through the winter on a ration of straw, hay, and roots, while a second season of good pasture will render it in good condition for fattening in the stable.—From The Canadian Live Stock and Farm Journal for June.

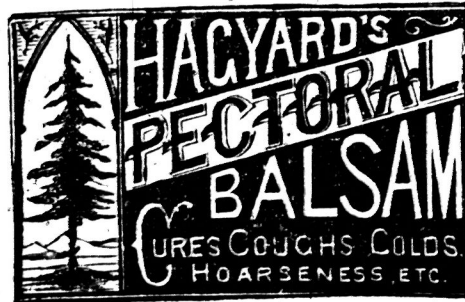

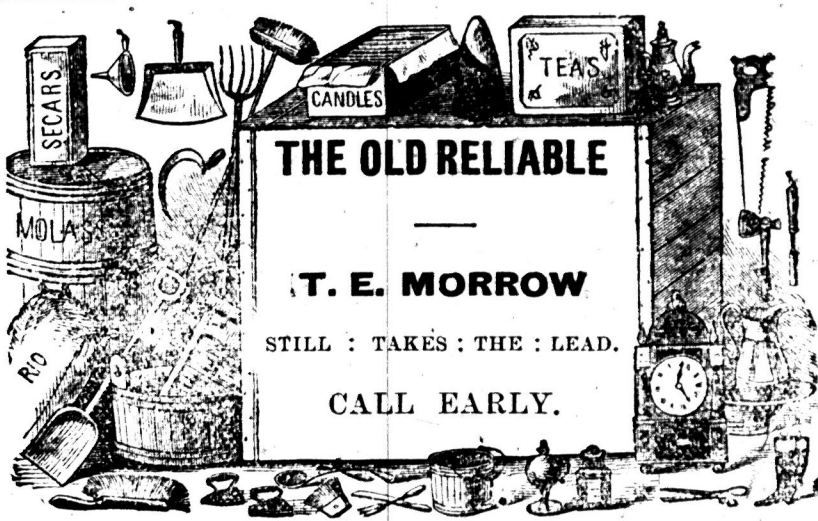
