Moore, two miles distance from my place came face to face with a large bear near his house. He hurried home for his Marlin repeater but bruin did not choose to await his return.

I mentioned in a former letter the large quantities of basswood taken out for R. W. Mutchmor & Co. along Lake Mendemoya's shores, but did not realize that the same would cause the death of one of our esteemed residents, Wm. Latham foreman for the said firm. He was crushed by some logs of a skid way starting to roll before he was prepared for them. We had often admired the skillful and daring feats of this man in past years. He had many friends and relations in Haldimand, among whom might be mentioned Mr. Wm. Dochstader, of the Stage Road Hotel.

The old fashioned state of contentment in which a majority of our settlers have dwelt in the past has been invaded by speculators bringing hundreds of horses to exchange for oxen and young cattle. Agents for all kinds of machinery forcing their wares upon the settlers to an extent far beyond their needs as well as fancy sleighs, buggies, etc.

The News in Brief.

The trouble with the Navajo Indians in Arizona is at an end.

The Toledo street car strike has been settled—a compromise.

A new seam has been struck at the anthracite coal mines in the Northwest.

Sir William Johnson, Orange grand master of Ireland, has arrived in Montreal.

Montreal proposes to have a great exhibition similar to the Toronto Industrial.

Mrs. Daniel McIntyre, of Minden, Ont., was killed by lightning on Saturday while ironing.

A movement is on foot in St. Thomas to erect a monument to the late Sir John Macdonald in that city.

The plumbers of London, Ont., have gone on strike for nine hours a day, 25 cents an hour and other improvements.

John Burns fell from a cable of the Suspension bridge 100 feet into the water on Saturday and was not much hurt.

Chief Secretary Balfour proposes to increase the grant for the relief of distress in Ireland in the next financial year by \$100,000.

The first new wheat marketed this season was bought by Mr. E. W. B. Snider, of St. Jacobs, Ont., from Mr. John L. Weber on Saturday.

Capt. McMicking, of the Welland battalion won the Prince of Wales' prize at Bisley on Saturday, and became the proprietor of a gold medal and £100.

By the terms of a new law in New York state the price of a sleeping car berth is put down to 80 cents. Passengers have hitherto paid \$2 each for berths.

At Indianapolis on Saturday morning 50 unknown men entered the jail at Spencer and lynched Frank Dice, awaiting trial for murder. They hanged him to the cell door.

Marsh, the defaulting president of the Philadelphia Keystone Bank, is hiding near Medina, Tenn. Policemen from Jackson have started after him with Winchester, in hope of securing the \$6,000 reward offered for his arrest.

Judge J. A. Warden, of Chattanooga, Tenn., who is under indictment for the murder of his son-in-law, the banker Simpson Fayette, committed suicide Thursday night at his residence on Lookout mountain by blowing out his brains.

A large party of expelled Russian Jews reached Montreal Wednesday per Hansa line steamer Pickhuben, and they are being cared for at the Baron Hirsch Institute in that city. The tales they tell show great inhumanity on the part of Russian officials.
