There is no better fastening for a colt than a broad strap around the neck, which may be secured by a heavy buckle, and a ring to which is attached a half-inch rope or a strap to match the neck strap. This should be firmly wrapped about the post when he is tied. An old post likely to be broken down or pulled up, should not under any circumstances be used for tving, as once led to fear the object to which he is tied, it will be difficult afterward to get him to stand quietly. 
