A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

From 150 to 200 cars of grain daily are passing through Winnipeg. Reports from California indicate a plentiful supply of raisins this season. Mr. Egerton W. King, editor of the Barrie Gazette, died Thursday. The forest fires in southern Indiana have assumed alarming dimensions. The apple crop in West Middlesex this year is the largest ever known. London will collect this year in taxes \$291,920.70, against \$336,701.62 last year. The South Perth election trial resulted in unseating Mr. Trow, personal charges being dropped. At Gananoque, William Corboy, suspecting his wife to be too intimate with a bachelor storekeeper, watched her on Sunday evening and discovered her in the merchant's private quarters, and shooting through the door nearly made an end of him, the ball going through his shirt collar and making a flesh wound in the back of his neck. The affair was town talk, and the merchant declining to prosecute Chief Ryan summoned Corboy for carrying firearms and he was fined \$20.

On Friday last a bullet crashing through the window of J. W. Bowman's store at the corner of King and Catharine streets, Hamilton, frightened a couple of men who had just passed the store. It was lucky for them that they were not in front of the window or they might have been killed. The accident was another case of "didn't know it was loaded." Percy Acres, a clerk in the store, was showing a customer a repeating gun. He pulled the hammer, not knowing it was loaded and it went off. The bullet bored a large hole in the \$30 plate glass.

The English laws, or rather magistrates, punish offences against property more severely than offences against the person. The stealing of an article, however small, is punished often with several months' imprisonment at hard labor, while the costermonger for "jumping on his mother" gets but a few days' incarceration, minus the hard labor. Wife beating, a favorite practice among what are termed the lower classes, are scarcely punished at all, unless the wife dies. Even then, unless death occurs immediately, the brute of a husband receives but a comparatively light sentence. On the other hand a deliberate murder perpetrated with a deadly weapon, or by poison, is followed by the hanging of the murderer within a few weeks. Recently a murderer was hanged and buried within a fortnight of the death and burial of his victim.
