Haldimand Assizes.

SEVEN YEARS IN PENITENTIARY FOR INCEST—ELECTION IRREGULARITIES.

CAYUGA, Nov. 3.—At the assizes here to-day Samuel Atkinson, convicted of the crime of incest, was sentenced to seven years in Kingston penitentiary. He is a man 52 years of age and the father of a large family. His wife believes him innocent and stuck to him until the last. She stood leaning against the dock when he received the sentence. Before being taken back to his cell he leaned over and bade her an affectionate good-bye. When asked what he had to say why he should not receive sentence he protested his innocence and charged his eldest daughter with having put up the other girl to swear the charge upon him.

In the charges of irregularities at the late election, the grand jury returned true bills against Henry J. Ince, four indictments: Jacob Brown, James Johnston, James Murray and Henry Hall. Henry Hall is charged with unlawfully giving a ballot paper, the others are charged with personation, or aiding and abetting personation. One of the indictments against Henry J. Ince was quashed, the other three stand till next assizes, as do all the other charges.

Fire at Port Dover.

A HOTEL, BILLIARD SALOON AND PRIVATE HOUSE GO UP IN SMOKE.

Last Tuesday morning, about 1.30 o'clock, an alarm of fire was rung and a prompt response made by everyone who heard it. When the citizens got to the scene of the fire it was found that Mr. D. L. Kelly's billiard parlor and house was in flames. The fire had got such a start before being discovered by him that it was impossible to save much. His two billiard tables and other furniture were consumed where they stood. He had about \$400 insurance, but his loss is heavy. The fire spread with amazing rapidity to the Erie House on one side and to the residence of Mr. Isaac Johnson, on the other. They being dry wooden buildings, could not be saved, despite the most strenuous exertions of many daring and willing workers. Fortunately there was very little wind at the time, and plenty of water was close at hand in some unused wells. This enabled the citizens to save all the wooden buildings, barns, stables, etc., close in the rear. The Erie House was occupied by Robert Graham, as a hotel. His furniture and piano was very much damaged in removal, and some of it might just as well have remained where it was for all the good it is now. He was insured for \$600, but loses heavily all the same. The Erie House was owned by H. W. Ansley, Esq., on which he had \$600 insurance. His loss is quite heavy also. Mr. Johnson got out the most of his furniture, on which he had no risk. He had a policy for about \$1000 on his house, stables and billiard room. The stable alone stands. His loss is very severe. —Maple Leaf.
