The Bees in Early Winter.

A correspondent of the American Cultivator says hives should be prepared for winter not later than November, and if a cold, early autumn sets in the work should be done on the first warm day-after the cold spell. Provided the weather remains warm enough, the later the bees are housed the better it is for them. The hives that are wintered indoors should not be taken in until cold weather is actually here for good, or else it may be necessary to move them back again on their summer stands should a warm spell follow. Before removing the hives inside the caps must be removed, and wire nailed over all the openings to prevent mice from entering.

To put the bees in the very best condition it is well to have them keep up a fair amount of brood rearing during August and September, for very little honey in most localities will be collected during these months. At the beginning of winter the colonies go into their new quarters, consisting of old bees, which | Catarrh, Not Local, But Constiwill die shortly, and strong voung stocks to begin the new season's work. During the scarcity of natural stores in early fall, plenty of food should be given to them to keep up the brood rearing. The important work of having a good queen should not be neglected, for the queen is the life of the colony.

Every colony needs 20 to 30 pounds of good sealed honey for the winter use, and if this is not stored up from natural beds it should be fed to them. If the feeding has been done in September the bees will seal up the stores before retir to their winter quarters. Granulated food is the safest food to feed the bees in winter, and syrup is never safe. It will give them dysentery, and make sad havoc in the colony.

### Success in Sheep Husbandry.

Personal attention is the secret of success in sheep raising, and especially in growing hot-house lambs. No matter how good your sheep are, nor how comfortable their quarters, if you leave the work to others you will not succeed. Not one out of 100 hired men will take the interest in them that is necessary for success.

Ewes about to drop their lambs should be carefully watched, for a little assistance at the proper time often means the saving of both lamb and dam. The flock should be looked at every four hours and not left more than six hours at the longest. This means early rising and late retiring, but it is essential if you are to succeed. You must not expect to find your lambs strong and on their feet if you leave the barn at six o'clock at night and do not get there

again until that time next morning. Sheep are very dainty in their tastes and will not eat musty hay or grain. They do not like ill-smelling troughs and racks, and these must be kept sweet and clean. An abundance of clean, pure water is essential, and the sheep should have ready access to it. Salt should also be where they can get at it, and it is not much trouble to keep a box well filled. It is the little things in sheep husbandry, as in all other kinds of business, wherein lies success, and close attention to these is what pays.

### A Remarkable Case.

### ASLEEP FOUR YEARS.

SCRANTON, Penn., Oct. 29.—The case of Michael Fernan, who has been asleep for the past four years at his home near Factoryville, is a very remarkable one. Fernan, who is about 50 years old, was born near the Lakes of Kalarney, Ireland, and came to this country in his boyhood. His early days were spent at Elizabeth, N. J., where he married, and worked for several years in the employ of the Delaware, Lackawana and Western Company. Fourteen years ago he moved to Factoryville, where he purchased a farm and prospered. He led a sober, industrious life, and when the Delaware Lackawana and Western Company began to hy its double track he secured employment as watchman at the tunnel then being built near his home.

Fernan watched faithfully at the turnel during the night and in the day worked diligently on his farm. He took but little sleep and frequently went several days and nights without any. He felt that being a strong man he did not need sleep, and so he continued to work day and night, until one evening in the fall of 1887, when he was seized with a violent headache. The pain became so great that he was compelled to quit work and take to his bed. He fell into a semi stupor and for a time appeared to be delirious. He raved considerably and for several days failed to recognize his nearest friends.

From this condition Fernan passed into a profound sleep. After a time his family tried to arouse him but could not. Then doctors were summoned, but they were powerless to wake the sleeper, who has continued his sleep ever since. His family think he is conscious at times. Some months ago when one of his children was being reprimanded, Fernan manifested much uneasiness and mut tered incoherently, and more recently when one of his sons died, the sleeper sobbed and moaned pitiously, but showed no other signs of consciousness.

About two years ago his family thought he was about to die and they knelt at his bedside in prayer. To their amazement he suddenly revived and sat up in bed, then sank back again and resumed his deep sleep. Although four years confined to his bed, Fernan looks as rugged as he did the first day of his strange experience. He takes food regularly twice a day. His appetite appears to be good and his sleep seems painless. His wife and children entertain the hope that some day he will shake off his fearful lethargy.

### Pitting Potatoes.

Where potatoes are to be kept through the winter, and are not wanted for market or use till spring, a well-constructed pit out of doors is the best way to keep them. Cellars are always too warm, and even a temperature of 50° starts the eyes whether the cellar be light or dark. In a dark cellar the potatoes in a bin will be found grown together if not examined frequently. In out-ofdoor pits, unless the winter is extremely warm, scarcely an eye will have started up to the time the pit is ready to be opened. Such potatoes for seed are worth double what the same potatoes would be kept so warm, that each eye is sprouted and must have its original growth broken off. It stands to reason that this first growth has greater vigor than will any one that starts afterward. The pit should be lightly covered and good ventilation be given up to the time of freezing. Just before that put on another coat of straw over the whole heap and cover with four or five inches depth of soil. If weather below zero is threatened in winter driw a few loads of manure from the horse stables and give the pit another covering. When thus trebly covered there is little danger that even zero weather will reach down to freeze the potatoes. - American Cul-


