The recent municipal census of Toronto makes the population of the city 188,914, as against 181,220 by the Dominion census last spring.

The Canadian stallion Hermit by Harold has now a record 2.16 $\frac{1}{2}$ . He is a pacer and while a young horse is already represented in the 2.30 list.

Four libel suits for \$50,000 each have been entered against the London Free Press for printing a document filed in connection with the Hyman election petition.

A change has been made in the proprietorship of the Norfolk House, Simcoe. Mr. L. Brady, for several years proprietor of the Mansford House, succeeds Mr. Q. H. Fick.

Arion, the world's best two-year-old, made a wonderful mile last week at Stockton, Cal., going against his record of 2.14 $\frac{1}{2}$ . He trotted the mile without a skip in 2.10 $\frac{1}{2}$ . Senator Stanford has refused \$60,000 for Arion. The trotting wonder is not for sale.

**SCHOONER WRECKED.**—In Sunday night's gale the schooner Montcalm, of Toledo, loaded with iron ore and a crew of six, having her main mast completely blown away and mizzen mast broken, became unmanageable and was driven among the rocks within 100 yards of shore half a mile below Selkirk on Lake Erie. Although it was very dangerous, one man swam ashore, while the rest remained with the wreck in the cold and wet awaiting the arrival of the tug Mary and the Government lifeboat which were despatched from Port Colborne. The crew were rescued about 1 o'clock, Monday, the gale having somewhat subsided. The boat, which had about 500 tons of iron ore, is a total wreck.

The Dunnville Natural Gas Co. completed their second well on Wednesday last. Gas was found in the Medina rock at a depth of 780 feet. The flow of gas is very satisfactory, and enables the company to furnish all the gas that the town requires for heating and manufacturing purposes. The town is piped, and it is being put into the houses as fast as possible. The company are furnishing the gas at from \$1 to \$2 a stove per month, and \$3 for furnaces, which is much cheaper than wood or coal. The quality of the gas is good. Senator McCallum is having a well put down on his extensive grounds, at St. Ronness, for his private use. He expects to reach the gas rock in two weeks. In all the wells in this field there have been indications of oil, and experts claim there is undoubtedly oil in this region, and a company is being formed to bore for oil there.
