A Stratford Swindler.

A Stratford despatch of the 17th inst. says—"For some weeks small advertisements have been inserted in The Empire and Hamilton Spectator calling attention to the 'Industrial Protective Alliance, devoted to the interests of the merchant, the manufacturer and mechanic; head office, Stratford, Ont.'" These flashy worded advertisements usually ended with a "send stamp for reply." The Alliance consisted purely and simply of a Beacon compositor named W. H. Spears, who hit upon this scheme to swindle the unwary. He got several hundred letters, many of them enclosing stamps, and it is said he got from \$50 to \$100 from "members" who were imbecile enough to send him \$1. Yesterday he learned that the game was up and left for Buffalo.

Rev. Walter P. Nelson Elopes with a Young School Teacher.

LANSING, Mich., Nov. 23.—Mr. J. V. Teetzel, Q.C., of Hamilton, had an affecting interview this morning with his sister Rosabel, the young school teacher of Malahide, Elgin county, Ont., who eloped on Thursday last with Rev. Walter P. Nelson, a Baptist minister of Port Burwell. Miss Teetzel consented to return with her brother to the home of an aunt in Windsor and make an effort to suppress her infatuation for Nelson. The whole party left on the Grand Trunk train for Port Huron, with Nelson in the custody of the sheriff, but it was not determined what further action would be taken. Mr. Teetzel is of the opinion that he can secure extradition papers upon a charge of abduction, but it is not clear whether he will pursue the matter further or not. He does not know Nelson and refused to see him here.

Nelson was permitted a few minutes conference with the object of his adoration in the presence of other parties. He urged her to reconsider her purpose of returning. She could hardly resist his frantic appeals, and was inclined to relent when he was taken from the room and fell in a dead faint outside.

On arriving at Lansing the couple went to the Commercial, where they were assigned separate rooms on different floors, and these they continued to occupy. They registered under their own names and made no attempt to conceal their identity.
