Country Roads.

The rains at this time of the year usually leave the roads in a very bad condition, and just now is the time when a g cod deal of marketing is required to be done, which unless sleighing comes is generally done at a great disadvantage, if done at all. A load which one horse can draw on level iron rails, on a smooth level asphalt road will require 13 horses: on good Belgian pavement 33 horses; on ordinary Belgian pavement, 5 horses; on good cobblestone road, 7 horses; on bad cobblestone road, 13 horses; on ordinary mud road, 20 horses; or sand road, 40 horses. From this it can easily be seen the less in horse power that is undergone by drawing loads on bad roads, and consequent loss to the farmer.

This road question is one of the greatest importance and about which there is a good deal of misunderstanding, and the cause of this is the lack of any standard of excellence. The expression good road is very indefinate. A man who has been brought up among roads where the mire is a foot deep in fall thinks that a road with only two or three inches of mud is well nigh perfect While on the other hand a man who has been accustomed to broken stone roads, which are never muddy, considers a road as very poor which has even two inches of mire.

Then the expression "a good road" must have some relation to the use to which the road is to be put. A highway which would be good as some back sideline but little travelled, might be very poor as a main line of travel.

Another cause of poor roads is the general apathy that prevails in the community regarding them, notwithstanding that the tax upon agricultural communities by such roads is one of the heaviest they have to contend with. Coupled with the popular apathy in in regard to good roads is much popular ignorance as to how they should be secured. It is needless to say that the present system of building and repairing our public roads by statute labor is a failure, and the sooner it is abolished and road commissioners appointed the better. A plan will be embodied in a bill to be introduced at the coming session of the Pennsylvania Legislature which provides for the election by the people of each township of three road commissioners, who are to be chosen, as far as possible, without regard to politics. and are to be free from procuniary influences. These commissioners are to appoint the roadmasters, pay them a specific salary and require them to supervise the farmers who are willing to work out their road tax. If the farmer fails to comply with his engage ments he will be charged with the tax. Besides this, the bill proposes a combination of county and state aid For every mile of permanent road built by the voluntary help of the farmers and approved by the county engineers and county commissioners, the Bill proposes that an additional mile should be built by the county and another by the state. The cost of improving these roads is thus divided up between the farmers who are willing to work out their road tax under the supervision of a competent engineer, and the county, which pays one-third from the tax on farmers who prefer to pay it instead of working it out, and the State, which pays onethird out of the general fund.

There is no doubt, too, that narrow waggon tires are conserably to blame for the poor condition of the country roads. If every man who draws heavy loads on the highway would substitute wide-rimmed wheels for the narrow rimmed ones we would have good, smooth roads the year round with half the expense that it costs now, and the heavy teams could draw one-third more
