A stockholder of the Chicago Cold Storage Exchange declares that the concern is insolvent, and owes \$250,000 now overdue.

Wolves are terrorizing the neighborhood of New Brighton, 15 miles from St. Paul, Minn., and it is said that three children have been devoured.

Three fourths of the wells and cisterns at Merrimac, Mass., are dry, and the Merrimac river is so low that water power is entirely exhausted.

Hill & Weir's printing establishment, on Temperance street, Toronto was gutted by fire Wednesday night. Loss, \$20,000; insurance about the same.

W. J. Brotherton, the man who attempted to trundle a wheelbarrow from San Francisco to Chicago, died at La Junta, Colorado, Thursday of mountain fever.

Miss Clara Holloway, of Philadelphia, died on her engagement night, while playing a game of euchre, and an autopsy disclosed the fact that tight lacing killed her.

McLaughlin's boot and shoe store, Tweedle & Ames' express office and confectionary store, and all the outbuildings connected with these establishments. White's bakery was partially destroyed, and some of the outbuildings attached to C. Jeffrey's shoe store. The loss is very heavy.

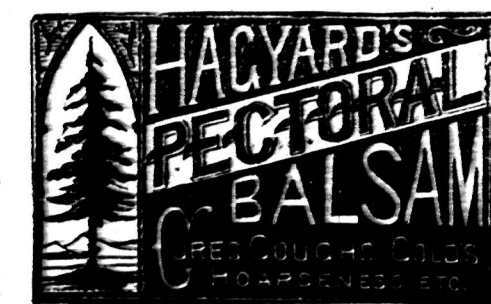
