## WALPOLE FALL FAIR.

The Weather was Fine and the  
Fair was a Grand Success.

A LARGER NUMBER OF ENTRIES THIS  
YEAR THAN IN PREVIOUS YEARS.  
OVER 5,000 PEOPLE PRESENT.

The Walpole Agricultural Society  
held their 29th Annual Fall Exhibition  
on their grounds in Jarvis on Thursday  
and Friday of last week, and was a very  
pronounced success. The exhibits were  
far in excess of those of former years,  
and the crowd on the second day was  
the largest ever seen on the grounds,  
owing to the extremely fine weather  
and special attractions. The splendid  
display of upwards of 250 fine specimens  
of horses in all classes created great  
surprise, and was the largest display  
ever made in this department. The  
entries in cattle were numerous, all the  
important classes, such as Durhams,  
Grades, Holsteins, Herefords and Jer-  
seys being represented. In sheep and  
swine the exhibit was good and the  
entries about equal to those of previous  
years, among them were some fine  
specimens. The display of poultry was  
good as usual, some handsome birds  
being exhibited. There was also a fair  
display in the grain and seeds, roots and  
vegetables, horticultural and dairy de-  
partments. Some very fine comb and  
extracted honey was shown in the  
appliance exhibit. The display of ladies'  
work was not equal to that of former  
years, and the hall was not as well filled  
as it should have been. The displays  
of furniture made by Messrs. S. Loun-  
berry and John Lambert was good and  
attracted a great deal of attention.  
The display of carriages, etc., was not  
as large as last year, although Messrs.  
Steel & Sower of this village did their  
share towards keeping this department  
well represented. The Village House  
was on the grounds and supplied the  
musical part of the entertainment.
