The British Government has decided not to call an autumn session of Parliament.

Three painters were blown from the great Forth bridge on Wednesday and killed.

At Morrisburg Thursday Aaron Fetterly was crushed to death between two trains.

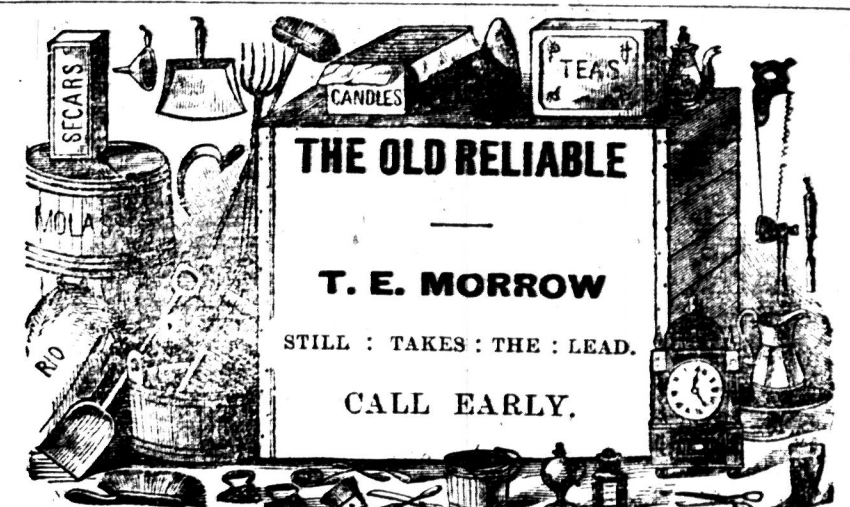
