

A New Use for the Phone.

The telephone is about to have a fresh
application—viz, that of foretelling
storms. A new discovery has been
made as to one of the properties of this
means of transmitting sound. By
placing two iron bars at seven or eight
metres distance from each other, and
then putting them in communication
on one side by a copper wire covered
with rubber, and on the other side with
a telephone, a storm can, it is said, be
predicted at least twelve hours ahead
through a dead sound heard in the
receiver. According as the storm ad-
vances the sound resembles the beating
of hailstones against the windows.
Every flash of lightning, and of course
every clap of thunder that accompanies
the storms produces a shock similar to
that of a stone cast between the dia-
phragm and the instrument.

The Credit system.

The correspondent who calls attention
to the hardships it would work to the
laboring classes if the credit system
were abolished, points out the tardiness
which characterizes all too many em-
ployers in the payment of wages. How
would it be possible, he asks, for farm
laborers, lumber men, railroad men and
others to exist were the credit system
abolished? The answer simply is that
if the credit system were abolished it
would have to be abolished all around.
There is no more reason why the laborer
should give credit to his employer in
the matter of wages than that the em-
ployer should give his customers credit
in the matter of what he produces.

When the credit system is abolished
wages will have to be paid promptly
and regularly, so that the laborer may
reap all the advantages of paying cash
for what he buys, instead of paying his
share, as he does now, of the bad debts
of others who have got credit and failed
to pay. If the merchants and the
grocers, the butchers and the bakers,
get cash for the goods they sell they
will be able to pay cash to the producers
and the manufacturers for what they
buy, and thus in turn the money will
come back to the mechanic and the
laborer. If the credit system were
abolished all around everybody would
get more for his cash. The only ones
who would suffer would be those who
get credit without intending to pay,
leaving the rest of us to foot the bills,
as this is what it amounts to in the end.
—Herald.


