Drilling Wheat or Sowing Broadcast.

It seems that some persons are yet in doubt as to whether it is better to use the drill or to sow broadcast. They claim that they get as good returns from broadcasting. It may be so in some seasons and on some kinds of soil, but as a rule it is not so, and more especially in the case of winter wheat. The drill deposits the grain at a more even depth, hence it comes up more uniformly to begin with. It also deposits it in such a way that it can better risk the influences of frost in winter. Grain that has been sown broadcast will heave in winter, when that which | has been drilled will not. This is true at least under some circumstances. Then there is a saving in the amount of the seed when the drill is used. This usually amounts to about one peck per acre. Now allowing that a drill costs \$60.00, and that one peck of seed is saved per acre, it would only require to sow about 240 acres of wheat to save for. its first cost in seed. It is thus apparent that a drill should pay for itself in the saving of seed which it effects. There is considerable difference of opinion as in brooches. to which is the best width or widths to have the drill tubes. Taking all things into consideration, it will be better to avoid extremes. Six inches would sometimes be found to be too narrow and ten inches too wide. In lands that of ladies nowadays. are not well drained, and especially where the plowing has been carelessly done, the objection has been urged that ice lodges in the drill marks and smothers the grain. This difficulty may be met by drilling across the ridges. But where the work of plowing has been well done it will not be serious, for favor among brooch wearers. although the drilling should follow the course of the ridges .- Canadian Live Stock and Farm Journal for October.

### The Butter Fat Problem.

"The further we go into the science of butter making the more difficult becomes the problem that confronts us." says American Dairyman. Now that the new testing machines tell us just how much butter fat there is in the milk and we know how much the resulting butter should be, but somehow we never get that much. What becomes of it? Sometimes it is found in the skim-milk, again in the butter-milk, and at other times it is not found at all, but is supposed to have stuck to the utensils. Creameries that keep close accounts are troubled with the erratic results of the butter yield, up one day and down the next. This is often accounted for by the irregular manner of running the separator. First, the milk must be at the correct temperature, then the feeding machine must not give too fast nor too slow, but just right, and above all things the machine must be run at a regular and correct speed. Any variation in these points will cut off the yield, and when two or more mistakes are made the loss becomes quite serious when a large amount of milk is handled. These points should be deeply impressed upon the manager of the creamery, who is often too ready to lay all the blame on the patrons, accusing them of watering or skimming the milk. The test machine, however, should tell just what there is in the milk received, and the butter-maker is responsible for that amount, and should at least know where it has gone.
