### Another Big Blaze.

JARVIS AGAIN VISITED CAUSING CONSIDERABLE LOSS OF PROPERTY.

About 12.15 Friday noon last fire was discovered in the oil house in the rear of F. H. Dowding's hardware store, a frame building, owned by Mrs. David Jones, separated only by an alleyway from the Post-Office block, the largest building on Main Street. The ringing of the fire bell soon brought the firemen and many willing workers to the scene of the fire. The engine was soon got in working order but could do nothing with the oil. The firemen saw there was no possible chance of saving the hardware store and set to work to save the Post-office block, and other buildings on the east side of the street.

It looked for a time as if the entire business portion of the village would be destroyed, and assistance was telegraphed for from Simcoe, but was not needed, as our firemen succeeded after a hard fight in confining the flames to the hardware store and Mrs. Shannon's residence, a frame building only separated by a few feet. A strong wind was blowing, and it was reported that there was about two kegs of powder in the store which caused the people to keep at a safe distance until it was learned that there was only about fifteen pounds which exploded blowing one side out of the hardware store and scattering the fire so that at one time a half dozen roofs were on fire, endangering the east side. The Post-office block was damaged considerably and was considered a hopeless case at one time. Dr. Howell's residence and the Whittaker block were on fire several times, and were only saved by great exertions. The firemen and citizens generally deserve great credit for their persevering exertions in saving property from the devouring element, and only for the strenuous efforts of many willing workers was the destruction of our thriving village averted. The losses and insurance are as follows: F. H. Dowding, stock of hardware, loss \$4,000, insured in the British America for \$2,000, saved about \$200; Mrs. David Jones' store, insured for \$400 in Merchants; Sill, Jones & Co., damage to stock \$900, in British America; Mrs. Sill, damage to store about \$350, in Merchants; Mrs. Shannon, in the Royal for \$700 on house and \$900 on contents, which were principally saved. The cause of the fire is unknown.

### Card of Thanks.

I take this opportunity of returning my sincere thanks to the citizens of Jarvis as well as those from the country for their determined and well directed efforts to save my stock from destruction by the late fire, and also to the ladies who as the saying is got there with both feet and worked so energetically beyond their ability during the conflagration. I also beg to tender my sincere thanks to those conducting the fire engine, and to a dozen of others who even risked their lives to quench the angry flames. Look out for advt. next week.
