Another old and highly respected
resident of Walpole, Mr. Daniel Keen,
departed this life on Sunday morning
last. He was apparently in good health
on Saturday until about 5 o'clock when
he was taken with a paralytic stroke
from which he did not recover and died
early Sunday morning. Mr. Keen has
lived on his farm near Balmoral for
nearly fifty years. The funeral took
place from his late residence yesterday
to the Presbyterian Church cemetery,
Stage Road, and the remains were
followed to their last resting place by a
large number of friends and relatives.

An interesting case was brought
before A. Rodgers and Henry Ivey,
J. P.'s in the Temperance Hall, on
Monday evening. The hall was packed
to the doors. Seven boys were charged
by J. C. Sanderson with disturbing
public worship at a prayer meeting
held in the Methodist Church, Jarvis,
on the evening of October 15th, by
making a noise in the entrance and
around the church and throwing beans
against the window. Mr. C. E. Barber,
of Simcoe, appeared in behalf of the
defendants. Two witnesses, John Pelley
and Mrs. D. Winger, were examined,
but no case was made and the charge
was dismissed. A. Rodgers, J. P., then
read the law in regard to church
disturbances, and we would advise the
boys to be careful in future, as it will
no doubt go hard with any who may
be caught in the act.
