CURRENT NOTES.

Saxony's cavalry has a new sword three inches shorter and considerably lighter than the old one. The blade is straight, and the handle is of hard rubber. The new weapon is more easily handled, but is less dangerous than the one hitherto used.

The ostrich is a long stepper. When feeding, his step measures from twenty to twenty-two inches; when walking, but not feeding, twenty-six inches, and when terrified, from eleven and one-half to fourteen feet, or at the rate of about twenty-five miles an hour.

A "potato walk" is the latest feature in Southern Virginia. It is described as a most novel and amusing diversion. To take a large, knobby potato from the floor in a small teaspoon in a given length of time and carry it the entire length of the room may seem easy, but it is not. Prizes are given to successful contestants.

The assizes throughout the country do not reveal many serious crimes. The country is occasionally shocked by the recital of a shocking murder, at which there is a shudder, and then when the case is brought before the judges there is another exposure, with another shudder, and if anybody is hanged the case comes before the public mind for the third time, with a third shudder. But it is all one case.

A new counterfeit \$1 Dominion note has been put in circulation, of the issue of June 1st, 1878. The paper is poor and the printing inferior, while the portrait of Lady Dufferin in the centre of the bill is wretchedly executed. The scroll work, too, is bad, and the space left for the signature of the Deputy Minister of Finance is left blank. These were the points noted for the official description of the bill.

S. C. Rees, a Western mining man, has a scheme by which he proposes to revolutionize mining and acquire considerable wealth. Instead of delving down in the earth for precious metals, he is going mining in a balloon. Along the precipitous sides of the deep canyons in the Rockies are many ledges which are known to be exceedingly rich in ore, but which are inaccessible on account of the immense height and sheer sides of the cliffs. Mr. Rees intends to reach these ledges in a balloon. He will anchor his large balloon to the bottom of the canyon with long ropes, and ascend to the point of the wall of the canyon where the ledge is. Then a foot hold will be worked into the ledge from the balloon, and the mining begun from that point.

Protests have been entered against the election of forty-five Conservatives and sixty-four Reform members of parliament. Of the 123 Conservatives thirty-six have petitions entered against them; of the ninety-two Reformers 70 per cent. are in a like predicament. Of all the members it is charged that more than one half are unfairly and illegally elected. Besides, seventeen petitions are entered against candidates who are not elected, of whom nine are Conservatives and eight are Reformers. So the judges who will try the charges have a lot of work before them. In this district petitions are entered in Lincoln, Welland, Monck, Haldimand, North Wentworth, Halton and Peel. Only South Wentworth and Hamilton escape. In Monck, Peel and Haldimand counter petitions are entered.

Smash-Up on the G. T. R.

HAMILTON, Sept. 16.—A serious accident occurred on the Grand Trunk east of this city this morning, resulting in much damage to property and delay to the traffic on the road. Luckily no lives were lost, but one trainman was badly injured. A regular freight going east from here, under the charge of Conductor Thomas Smith, collided with a special freight just east of Stoney Creek station on the main line. The engines were both moguls, and being very heavy they did not leave the track or fall over, but jammed together with the fronts of the boilers crushed in and interlocked. The cars piled up on this immovable mass of iron and fell over to the side of the track, almost crushing a sectionman's house occupied by John Cloughlin. Cecil Winter, a brakeman on the special train, was caught in the wreck and had his right leg broken in two places and his left foot crushed. He was removed to the city hospital, where the right leg was amputated six inches below the knee. Winter lives on George street, Toronto. The other trainmen jumped and escaped. About a dozen cars loaded with wheat, household goods, bricks and glassware were smashed. In the regular train was the valuable trotting horse Henry R., owned by George Robinson, of St. Catharines. He was being brought back from the Detroit races, where he won a \$600 purse in the 2.27 class. When the collision occurred the horse was thrown heavily, and injured his spine so badly that his hindquarters were paralyzed and he had to be shot. He was valued at \$3,500. It was a sad sight at the scene of the accident to see the colored rubber of Robinson's horse-sitting beside the dead body of Henry R. crying as though his heart would break at the death of his favorite.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—An anonymous letter was sent to Superintendent Brown, of the Newark Police Department, signed "A broken-hearted widow," in which the writer said that disgrace had fallen upon her two daughters through their attendance at moonlight picnics. She wrote:

"Mr. Brown, I do not ask you to stop these young girls from going to picnics for my sake. My family is already ruined, but I sincerely hope that other blind mothers will be brought to profit through my misfortune."

The effect of this letter has been that Superintendent Brown has issued an order for the arrest of girls under 16 years of age who are found on the street after 9 p.m. A close watch will be kept on the regular picnics, and if a young girl is found visiting picnic parks with improper escorts they will be taken in charge by the police.
