A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

Francis Bickley, of London, Ont., has fallen heir to some property in England.

Three thousand people have lost their lives by the floods in Spain, and thousands of live stock have perished.

The twenty fourth annual meeting of the Canadian Medical Association opened in Montreal Wednesday with nearly 100 delegates present from all parts of Canada.

It is announced that Mr. Peter Red-Path will place a magnificent new library building at the disposal of McGill University. The bequest will amount to about \$200,000.

The grand jury at St. Catharines in the case of James Bradshaw, charged with rape, found no bill and the prisoner was discharged. This closed the business of the Lincoln Assizes.

Fitzsimmons, who was in jail at Pittsburgh awaiting trial for the murder of Detective Gilkinson some time ago, has escaped from the prison. Fitzsimmons was said to belong to Brockville, Ont.

The agents in New York of the coal producing companies have ordered prices advanced 10 to 25 cents per ton on October 1. Broken is advanced 10c., egg and stove 15c., and chestnut 25c.

Phil Robinson, special commissioner of the London Times, is in Montreal. He is on his way to the Pacific coast by the C. P. R. and is engaged to write a series of articles on Canada in 1891 for the Times.

Cecil Winter, a Grand Trunk brakeman, who lives on George street, Toronto, had his leg broken in a smash up east of Hamilton Wednesday, and the leg was amputated below the knee. He is in Hamilton hospital.

Jenkins, a middle-aged and prominent member of the First Presbyterian church in St. Louis, has been arrested, charged with embezzling nearly \$14,000 from his employers, Armstrong, Gilbert & Co., cork manufacturers, whose trusted cashier and bookkeeper he has been for seven years. Jenkins speculated in mining stocks, and this caused his ruin.

The judge directed that he be kept in jail until November 3 and then discharged. Mr. Nesbitt argued that the girl was in company with another girl of loose character at the time the offence was committed, and consequently her own virtue was doubtful. McDonald is a married man with a family.
