Atkinson After Schwenger.

AN ALLEGED CASE OF MALICIOUS PROSECUTION CAUSES TWO SUITS.

Samuel Atkinson, the plasterer who spent seven weeks in jail owing to the alleged malicious prosecution of Charles Schwenger, of the Dufferin House, made the first move last evening in his attempt at getting even. He played two cards, each in the form of a writ for damages at the nominal sum of \$2,000. Schwenger being named as the defendant in the first and John Fothergill in the second.

Atkinson's story is that his wife and family were in Fisherville, and being out of work he became indebted to Schwenger for several week's board, and as he could not pay, Schwenger had him arrested for obtaining money under false pretences. Previous to his arrest he had got John Fothergill, an acquaintance, to cash a note for \$5 signed by a third acquaintance named Hall. After Atkinson was jailed, Hall denied the note and Fothergill laid a second charge of fraud against the prisoner. At the Assize Court last week Chief Justice Armour refused to allow the cases to go to the jury and he was set at liberty.

Atkinson is well connected in Hagersville.—Spectator.

The whole state of Maine is experiencing a severe drought and typhoid fever is raging in many towns. The cotton mills at Waterville and Augusta and the sawmills along the Kennebec are seriously retarded.

Burglars tapped a safe in the Northern Pacific railway office at Brandon, Man., early Saturday morning and got about \$100. In a smaller safe alongside the one broken was a package containing \$45.00.

There is great danger of a water famine at Saratoga.

The rainmakers claim to have scored a success at Corpus Christi, Texas.

Ten Virginia negroes have been sentenced to death for the murder of another negro.

Six hundred buildings remain standing at Consuegra, Spain. There were 2,100 before the flood.

A serious epidemic of influenza prevails at Melbourne, Australia.

Edge, the English bicyclist, has broken the record from London to Edinburgh, covering the 397 miles in 38 hours 44 minutes.

Mr. F. D. Boyes, a collector for the G. T. R., in a violent fit of coughing burst a blood vessel in his head and died suddenly in Hamilton Sunday.

A 20-ton fly wheel at a Cincinnati electric power house burst on Friday and tore through the roof, doing great damage. One employee was hurt.

Dozens of families were awakened and scared on Saturday night by an earthquake shock at Decatur, Ill. No damage was done. The shock extended south to St. Louis.

Richard Howell, who claims the bicycle championship of the world, sailed from Liverpool for New York Thursday. Accompanying Howell, were other bicyclists, who, with Howell, will take part in a six-days' bicycle contest in New York.

Samuel Harris, aged 26, of San Francisco, has made a fortune in the Paumotu islands and has married the daughter of King Tokatia. Harris is prime minister and expects to succeed the king as monarch over the 90,000 inhabitants of the islands.

Constable Davis, of Blyth, on Saturday morning, single handed, captured three men giving the names and addresses of James Roberts, of Goderich; Thomas Morris, of Windsor, and George Taylor, of Hamilton, who were in the act of breaking into F. Metcalfe's jewelry store at Blyth.

Prof. James Haley, a well-known light-weight boxer and proprietor of the Long Island hotel, New York, died there of blood poisoning Thursday. The poisoning was the result of a blow he struck an unknown man who insulted his wife. Haley's hand came in contact with the stranger's teeth and was badly lacerated.
