JUDGMENT BY DEFAULT.—A case,

fourteen are required to attend school

the full term, each year, unless having

legal excuse, and all parents and guar-

dians of children failing to attend are

liable to a fine of not less than \$5. The

law is a good one. There are too many

children who spend the school hours

on the streets or in worse places, learn-

ing mischief instead of letters. All

citizens should assist in enforcing the

Truancy act.
