He was Sec.-Treas. of the Port Dover School Board for many years and member of the Board for a long time. He was an enthusiastic Agriculturist and held the office of Sec. of the Woodhouse Agricultural Society as long as it was a society getting no reward but thanks from a few who knew the amount of work required to be done, and abuse from the many who did not know and did not want to. He was a worthy member of the Presbyterian Church and an office Bearer in it for a quarter of a century. Although a life long and staunch Reformer he was always kind and generous towards those who held opposite views in this respect. He was a true loving husband and a tender, kind hearted father, and will be much missed in the Council, the Church, the Town and by a circle of friends who had the pleasure of knowing him intimately and it was a large circle, yet much more will be missed in the home circle, always so dear and sacred to him where he was always to be found. Ill health attended him for a long time past but he bore it with the calm resignation of one who felt it would soon be over for ever. Two of his son's died some years ago, and he leaves a widow, son and daughter to mourn his sore loss. They have the sympathy and good will of a wide circle of friends and acquaintances.
