## The Hagersville Demonstration.

Some of the features of the recent mutual admiration and general pacification picnic recently held at Hagersville by our Liberal Conservative friends were amusing and some were nauseating. It was certainly a sight for the gods to see the veteran Sir Charles hand and glove with the glib Doctor, and to hear their mutual praise and kind words must surely be amusing to those who have watched the inside workings of the great Liberal Conservative party and who know that not so many months ago these two were at daggers drawn. But the hope of power and of the loaves and fishes have drawn these two together again and for the same reason now that peace and good will are in the air, may we not expect to see Sir Charles and the erstwhile organizer "Bob" Birmingham hobnobbing together again.

Many who attended were greatly disappointed that no policy was outlined by the leader of the opposition, in fact the speeches of all those on the platform might be summed up in three phrases, "We are the natural successors of Sir John A. McDonald and his mantle has fallen upon us." "None of the Liberals know how to govern this country and the whole collective wisdom is concentrated in Sir Charles and his following." "We are going to win the next election and there can be no doubt of it because we have said it."

Of course these sentiments are very flattering to the gentlemen who enunciated them, but elections are not to be won on unsupported statements and abuse and belittlement of Sir Wilfred Laurier and his Cabinet are not going to induce the electorate of this country to turn out a tried and true government on the demand of gentlemen who suggest nothing of improvement, but who simply say we can do better.

It was reserved however for one of our own townsmen Dr. Jacques to be the mouth-piece of the most howling farce of the picnic and we must hope for the credit of our own burg that he was only the mouth-piece and that that precious document, "A complimentary address to Hon. D. Tisdale, M. P." was penned in haste by some of the Liberal friends.

The address certainly deserves to take a high rank in the world of fiction. Fiction has been defined as the "Art of interestingly lying," and judged by that standard this address would carry off the seven storied cake which Dr. Montague was presented with. It contains within its limits more fulsome flattery and more misleading statements than the most imaginative novelist ever dared to write. The idea of referring to the "able administration" of the department of militia by the worthy Col., when as a matter of fact he only occupied the position for a few weeks and did absolutely nothing is excruciatingly funny and must commend to all the policy of "masterly inactivity" of which the late Sir John A. McDonald was so constant a practitioner. Then the uncalculated and dastardly attack on Hon. Dr. Borden's administration of this department calls forth the indignation of all right thinking men. Ye gods think of an address delivered on the same platform on which sat Dr. Montague one of "the nest of traitors" referring to the insubordination of his officials. What would Sir Mackenzie Bowell have to say about insubordination? Then the address refers to Major General Hutton as the "ablest chief commander ever sent over the sea." What a sudden conversion. It is only a short while ago that the whole Conservative press were calling out against this man, and he it was and not the Hon. Dr. Borden who recommended the appointment of what are so graciously called "Kentucky Colonels" in this address.

But enough, the further we go the worse it gets and so we will even leave it with the fervent hope that Hon. D. Tisdale will survive the process of digesting this interesting document. Complimentary it is called, but it is cruelly misnamed. It should have been entitled "A peon of worship of our sitting member and diatribe of abuse of his successor in office." Let us hope however for the credit of this constituency that we have seen the last of this "idol worship" and that hereafter our political controversies will be governed by decency and common sense.
