## King Edward's Message.

"Confident Trust in the Devotion and Sympathy of the People Throughout My Vast Colonial Dominions."

London, Feb. 5.—The King has sent the following message to all British Colonies and dependencies:

"To my people beyond the seas: The countless messages of loyal sympathy that I have received from every part of my dominions over seas, testify to the universal grief in which the whole Empire now mourns the loss of my beloved mother."

"In the welfare and prosperity of her subjects throughout the greater Britain the Queen evinced a heart-felt interest. She saw with thankfulness the steady progress which under the wide extension of self government, they had made during her reign. She warmly appreciated their unfailing loyalty to her throne and person, and was proud to think of those who had so nobly fought and died for the Empire's cause in South Africa."

"I have already declared that it will be my constant endeavor to follow the great example which has been bequeathed to me. In these endeavors I shall have confident trust in the devotion and sympathy of the people and of their several representative assemblies throughout my vast colonial dominions. With such loyal support I will, with the blessing of God, solemnly work for the promotion of the common welfare and security of our great Empire over which I have been called to reign."
