NEW TIME SYSTEM URGED. The Proper Treatment

Big Change in Calendar.

DAY IS TO BEGIN AT MIDNIGHT.

The new century will bring about many changes, but perhaps none of such every-day importance as the proposed new method of time-keeping. One of the most practical results will be that noon at Greenwich will be 12 o cicck all over the world. At present each day is spread over fortyeight (and in some instances lifty-five) hours in different places. With the respected residents of the township new system it will have its beginning and end within twenty-four hours all over the globe. The hours on our watches and clocks, too, will run from 1 to 24. It would seem odd for a while to order theatre carriages at 2.30 in place of 10.30.

The waggish reply, "A quarter past made by the policemin in the "Bab Ballads," will become the correct way of indicating "a quarter past 1." The fixing of a universal prime meridian will do away with the ambiguity which, as railways and telegraphs become multiplied, lead to such comusing complications in social and commercial affairs, to errors in chronology, to litigation in connection with succession to property, insurance matters, contracts, etc. The present variations of time are readily demonstrated by selecting points in four regions about thirty degrees apartfor instance, Japan, Arabia, Newfoundland and Alaska. On Sunday at midnight in Japan it is noon in Newound and.

Variation of time forms the pivotal point of the play "Around the World in Eighty Days," in which the traveler who wagered at his London Club that he could go around the world and be back at the club in eighty days so nearly lost He had forgotten this difference of a day and thought that he had completed his journey twentyfour hours too late.

Does anyone ask, "What is going to straighten this out and bring about order out of existing chaos? The answer is by simply putting into operation the results of the delibcrations of the international meridian conference, which met in Washington at the invitation of President Arthur in October, 1884, expressly to establish a prime meridian and a universal day.

The following resolution was adopted by Congress

This universal day is to be a mean solar day; is to begin for all the world at the moment of mean midnight of the initial meridian, coinciding with the beginning of the civil day and date of that meridian and is to be counted from zero up to twenty four hours. conterence expres

hope that as soon as practicable the astronomical and nautical days will be arranged everywhere to begin at mean midnight.

'The conference expresses the hope that the technical studies designed to regulate and extend the application of the decimal system to the division of angular space and of time shall be resumed, so as to admit of the extension of this application to all cases in which it presents real advantages."

Coming down to our own day, what else is the sand glass, which a few years ago was in common use in kitchens to show the cook when the eggs were boiled. And is not the modern clock based on the same principles? In the clepsydra the water in the motor; the perforation, the escapement; while the sinking of the shell or bowl is the index of completion of a definite period.

A curious use of the clepsydra in Greece was for limiting the length of speeches in the courts. In important cases additional amount of time was allowed and each side was permitted fifty gallons of water, necessitating the use of unusually large amphorae. When a speaker was interrupted to save the time being charged against him he would order the official to stop the water. This practice

might be revived with profit. The system of timekeeping in Rome divided the day and night into four watches, which were determined roughly by observing the courses of the sun and stars. Noon was announced publicly by an official, who, from the senate, watched for the appearance of the sun at a certain point. Among the Montagness Indians a crude form of sun dial is used in hunting, to let the squaws, who follow their lords and masters, know whether they may take it easy or hurry up, for they might fare badly if they lagged behind when their husbands were ready for supper. And so the men when hunting erect in the snow a stick at some wellknown place and draw the exact line of the stick's shadow in the snow before going on.-Chicago Chronicle.

CHANGE THEIR OLD NAMES. Many Begin Life in New World Under New Alliases.

The clerk of the city court to-day made public the names of seventy persons who changed their names in legal form in the year 1900. Most of the original names are of palpably foreign extraction. As a rule all reasonable requests for change of name are granted. They are then filed away, the petition giving the avowed reasons for change and the judgment passed upon it by the court. A glance at the records and the various name changes gives rise to considerable speculation as to tire real cause of dissatisfaction. Why, one wonders, should a name of such aristocratic twang as Waldemar Ruthyar be cast aside in preference to the hackneyed title of Henry Smith? On the next page of the records is the reverse of the question of high-sounding names, where one finds the somewhat plebeian cognomen of Gumbinsky changed to Von Tilzer. What evidence of nationality remains in the name of Jay, unless it is discovered to be a corruption of Jacobowsky? There scarcely could be any greater effacement of a family name than to substitute the noncommittal blank for Polanger. Sebastian Bibo is lost entirely in

Frank Walter and Rusicka becomes the Americanized Rose. Many changes result from family quarrels, when another family name is taken in place of the legitimate one. Often the wills of eccentric relatives demand a change in the name of the beneficiary, without which no legacy can be obtained. Occasionally debt or imprisonment has brought the name of some person into such disrepute that a new name is sought for which a new reputation may be built. In the case of foreigners who have become American citizens the etiff consonants of Russia, Bohemia or Poland prove too much for our Anglicized tongues and a change is really necessary. Under this reason come such changes, no doubt, as Chmelicek to Luhan, Neugroschel to Rochelle, Yuzukjian to Yuzuk, and Rochmovitz to Rockmore. By far the larger part of the list of changed names belongs to those ending in ski or sky. The terminal here is generally dropped, leaving the parent stem. The dropping of this ending results often in names that bear not the slightest trace of the nationality of the changers. Kempinski becomes plain Kempin; Jampolsky is reduced to the Dickenslike name of Jampole. -N. Y. Evening Post.


