When the Methodist church in Canada undertook about a year ago to raise a million dollars as a twentieth century fund, there were not a few who thought they had undertaken a task which it would be impossible for them to carry out. It was with great pleasure therefore that the report of the treasurer of the fund was received a week or so ago, announcing the fact that the \$1,000,000 mark had not only been reached but passed by \$150,000, and all reports were not yet in. This is certainly a grand achievement and will enable the church to start the new century strongly equipped for good work.

A quiet agitation is in progress in the County in favor of good roads. All things point to the general desire of the public that the County should buy a stone crusher. It is very likely that in this, as formerly, Rainham will be the first to make a decided beginning in abolishing statute labor, and building a mile or two of good roads, for such good means. Urquhart Rittenhouse and others are taking the matter in hand. Their idea is to have the stone crusher owned by the County, and make municipal rollers of boilers filled with cement, and rigged up to be worked by traction engines. Advocate.

The annual report of the postmaster-general for the year 1900 has been printed and distributed. The revenue for the sale of postage stamps, cards, etc., for the past year falls short \$53,000 of the total amount derived in the previous year. The decrease being attributed to the 2c rate. The total number of letters posted in Canada during the year was 178,292,500; post-cards 27,130,000; free letters 6,319,000; newspapers, transient periodicals, etc., packages, etc., 3,303,750; fourth class matter, 2,940,000; and cased parcels for Britain and elsewhere. Of the above letters Ontario sent out ninety millions.

### Will Pay \$53,000.

Sir Frank Smith's Estate Liable to Huge Succession Duty.

Toronto, Jan. 28.—Sir Frank Smith's will is ready for probate. It disposes of an estate of \$1,279,564, and the succession duty will be \$65,000. There is real estate in Toronto, London and Ingersoll, valued at \$128,380; stocks and bonds of Niagara Navigation Company, and stocks of various banks, \$645,080.50; stock in gas companies, \$257,077; bonds of various companies \$116,000; other stock, \$120,131; furniture, etc., \$14,895. His grandson gets \$4,000 a year; each grandchild gets \$600 a year. One-third of the residue of the income goes to each of the daughters for life.

Emitz W. Barron, a clerk in the Dominion Bank at Winnipeg, was almost instantly killed while playing hockey in the Bank League game Friday night. It appears he had a weak heart, and one of the opposing team lifted the puck as Barron was rushing towards him, and the puck hit him in the region of the heart. He fell like a log, only drawing a few breaths before he died. Young Barron was about 23 years of age and very popular. He was a son of Judge Barron, of Stratford. This is about the first fatal accident of this kind on record.

### LT. NELLES DEAD.

Son of Lt. Col. Nelles, Late of the 37th Regiment.

Toronto, Ont. Jan. 30.—Lt. Col. Nelles tonight received a copy of a cablegram addressed to the Governor-General by Sir Alfred Milner, announcing the death yesterday at Bloemfontein, of his son, W. H. Nelles, of peritonitis. Lieut. Nelles has been in South Africa for four years, and during the greater portion of that time has served as an engineer in railway construction work. Upon the arrival of the Strathcona Horse at Cape Town he joined that regiment, and later received a commission in the commander in chief's body guard and served in that capacity throughout the war. He was assistant adjutant with the "Midlanders" in the North West in 1885, and was a graduate at the Kingston military school, having spent four years in that institution.

Lt. Col. Nelles' many friends in Haldimand will regret to learn of his son's death and extend to him and his family their heartfelt sympathy.
