CURRENT NOTES

The Presbyterians have done nobly. Their 20th century fund has reached a point near \$1,300,000, and belated subscriptions are still coming in.

Twenty-six lecturers in connection with Farmers' Institutes started out last week on their winter lecturing tour throughout the Province. Cold storage and pulp raising are the main themes they will talk on to the farmers this year.

Evangelist Shaver has been horse-whipped by a woman on the street at Coburg because of something he said in the pulpit. The action of the woman is not greatly to her credit, but it is open to doubt if much moral good comes from speeches that lead to such results.

William Jennings Bryan, the twice defeated Presidential candidate, in a speech in Chicago the other day said: "Cronje suffers in loneliness on St. Helena, but his name will live in poetry and song when the name of Roberts is forgotten, and Kruger will wear a crown of deathless fame when kings and emperors are known no more."

The voting machine was used for the first time in Canada at the municipal elections in Oshawa on Monday. The accounts so far received agree that it is a success. No mistakes are reported, and it is said the returns were announced a few minutes after the close of the polls. Whether this is in itself worth the outlay for the machines is, of course another matter.

The three distinguishing characteristics of the late Philip D. Armour, according to President Harper, of the University of Chicago, were hard work, kindness of heart and breadth of mind. He was always ready to give to a needy friend or stranger, and was working to his limit almost all the time. In other words, Mr. Armour worked hard for his money and spent it liberally when he got it.

The Wabash Railroad has issued a new rule. The passengers on leaving the cars are directed to leave by the rear platforms. Those entering the cars are to do so by the front platforms. The agents of the company are directed to inform all passengers of the new rule. It is hoped to obviate unnecessary delays at local stations, especially when traffic is heavy. Other railway companies might profitably follow this example.

A deputation representing the Sheriffs of Ontario interviewed the Premier and Attorney-General yesterday to protest against any further curtailment of their official fees. "It was pointed out that various innovations had cut the fees of office in half during the past few years, although the people were paying just as much in law costs. The proposal to abolish courts of session would further diminish the fees, it was alleged." Why not substitute salaries for fees? If it is necessary to maintain the office and the dignity of the Sheriff, there ought to be enough in the job for a man to live on.

DR. MONTAGUE'S SPEECH.

On the Cultivation of the Foreign Market.

Hon. Dr. Montague, of Hamilton, speaking to the toast of Canada and the Contingent at the banquet of the Packer's Association in Toronto Thursday night, made an exceedingly clever speech, which kept the gathering in excellent humor. He commented upon the strange comingling of canners and those who handled their goods he saw around him which indicated unity of thought and purpose, and suggested that the consumers looked with suspicion upon combinations. Speaking for himself, he said he had some experience of gentlemen who belonged to combinations, but he had yet to meet the gentleman who belonged to combination which existed for the purpose of raising prices. (Laughter) He had been astonished, when preparing facts for a debate in Parliament in connection with the trade question, at the marvellous growth of the packing industry which had made Canada so well known abroad and had driven out all competitors in the home market. He argued that no better thing could be done than to cultivate the foreign market for Canadian canned goods. He congratulated the canners on their success in the past, and wished them greater success in the future. He expressed pleasure at the kind words spoken in reference to the Canadian boys who went to South Africa to fight for Queen, or country and for mother land to render the aid she had given. He regretted that there had been in the past in Canada a want of that strong Canadian national spirit which had shown itself during the past year, and which had inspired the Canadian people from ocean to ocean. He was one of those who believed that Canada owed her prosperity and safety to the fact that in the past we have had the strong supporting arm of the land beneath and around us, or the great American nation willing to attack us, would long years ago have taken us in.

Distribution of Samples of Seed Grain and Potatoes.

To THE EDITOR OF THE RECORD

During the past twelve years samples of those varieties of grain, etc., which have succeeded best on the several Experimental Farms have been distributed on application in 3-lb. bags, free through the mail, to farmers in all parts of the Dominion. The object in view in this distribution has been to add to the productiveness and improve the quality of these important agricultural products throughout the country, by placing within reach of every farmer, pure seed of the most vigorous and productive sorts. This work has met with much appreciation and a large measure of success.

Under instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture another distribution will be made this season. Owing to the very large number of applications annually received, it is not practicable to send more than one sample to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats, he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley or potatoes, and applications for more than one sample for household cannot be entertained. These samples will be sent only to those who apply personally, lists of names from societies or individuals cannot be considered. The distribution will consist as heretofore of samples of oats, spring wheat, barley, field peas, Indian corn and potatoes.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent any time before the 1st of March, 1901, after which date the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may all be sent out in good time for sowing. Parties writing, will please mention the sort of samples they would prefer, naming two or three different varieties of their choice. Should the available stock of all the varieties named be exhausted, some other good sort will be sent instead.

The samples of grain will be sent early but potatoes cannot be distributed until danger of injury in transit by frost is over. No provision has been made for any general distribution of any other seeds than those named.
