LONDON, Jan. 22, 7.03 p.m. A telegram from the Prince of Wales to the Lora mayor is as follows: "Osborne, 6.45 p.m.—My beloved mother has just passed away surrounded by her bildren and grand-children. (Signed) ALBERT EDWARD." (Signed) Deep and universal as is the sorrow over the death of the Sovereign Lady who has so long reigned over the British Empire, it will be mitigated by the thought that the Queen has passed away without any prolonged illness or intense pain. She had been blessed with long life, and her life's work was well done. From the first day of her reign to the last, she enjoyed the love and confidence of her subjects, and in dying she leaves to succeed her upon the throne a beloved son who is in every way fitted to fill her place.
