Oysters galore were served in the hall to upwards of seven hundred people. The Baptist church proved inadequate to accommodate the great throng and an overflow meeting was held in the Methodist church which was likewise crowded. The meeting in the Baptist church was presided over by Robt. Buckley, Esq. On the platform were Ptes. Long and Knisley and Gunner Stringer. After prayer by Rev. Mr. Newham, Dr. Sherk read to Pte. Long an address of welcome and appreciation, after which Rev. Mr. Hull presented on behalf of his friends and admirers with a magnificent gold watch suitably inscribed.

QUEEN VICTORIA DEAD!

Passed Away With The Members Of Her Family Around Her.

COWES, Jan. 22, 6.55 p.m.—The Queen is dead.
LONDON, Jan. 22, 7.03 p.m.—A telegram from the Prince of Wales to the Lord Mayor is as follows:—"Osborne, 6.45 p.m.—My beloved mother has just passed away surrounded by her children and grandchildren. (Signed) ALBERT EDWARD."

Deep and universal as is the sorrow over the death of the Sovereign Lady who has so long reigned over the British Empire, it will be mitigated by the thought that the Queen has passed away without any prolonged illness or intense pain. She had been blessed with long life, and her life's work was well done. From the first day of her reign to the last, she enjoyed the love and confidence of her subjects, and in dying she leaves to succeed her upon the throne a beloved son who is in every way fitted to fill her place. The position of the British Empire in the family of nations is assured, and the world joins in mourning for one who was equally respected within and without her dominions. The Queen is dead, but her memory will long be enthroned in the hearts of the people who, scattered throughout many lands, paid her allegiance.
