CANADA AND PAN-AMERICAN.

Splendid Representation of British American at Buffalo.

FROM THE SIOUX CITY (IA.) DAILY TRIBUNE.

It certainly is high time for something to occur to bring the people of the United States and of the Dominion of Canada into closer communion. During the progress of the Toronto Fair there was a large attendance from Buffalo, Rochester, and other cities of Western New York. Next year the Canadians will have an opportunity to reciprocate by attending the Pan American at Buffalo.

Doubtless few people of the United States realize what an extensive country lies to the north of the imaginary line separating the United States from Canada. Few have ever thought that this country has a larger area than the United States, even including its latest acquisitions, Porto Rico and the Philippines. Some idea, too, can be gained of the vast wealth in timber lands which Canada possesses when it is stated that about 38 per cent. of this great area is covered with forests, while not more than 25 per cent. of the area of the United States is thus covered.

Possibly many in the United States who imagine themselves fairly well posted regarding all the nations of the continent will be surprised to learn that Canada has such great advantages in the matter of transportation facilities. They will hardly credit the statement that Canada has \$180 per head of her population invested in railways, while, according to the latest reports of the Interstate Commerce commission, the United States has \$150 per head so invested. The efficiency of the 17,400 miles of railway in Canada is illustrated by the fact that when the British government recently made inquiry about the carrying power of the Canadian Pacific railway in order to ascertain at what rate per diem troops could be transported from the Atlantic to the Pacific on the way to China the reply was, 5,000 troops a day and the time 100 hours for each shipment of troops.

In mineral wealth and in agricultural resources Canada is marvelously favored; but this wealth is at present largely undeveloped, notwithstanding the progress that has been made in utilizing it. The Pan-American will give a splendid opportunity for presenting to the people of the whole western continent, and indeed of the whole globe, these remarkable advantages.

The revenue derived by the Ontario crown lands department during the past year was nearly \$1,500,000, or almost \$200,000 more than the previous year. The increase was in a large measure due to the greater activity of the lumbermen, who took advantage of the strong demand for their product.

The testing of the vitality of Seed at the Central Experimental Farm.

To THE EDITOR OF THE RECORD.

The past season has in certain localities been unfavourable for the perfect maturing of grain. In some districts it has been injured by rain during harvest or from being stacked before fully dry, thus causing it to sprout or heat, while in other localities it has suffered more or less from early autumn frost. When exposed to either of these conditions cereals are apt to lose a portion of their vitality or to have it so weakened as to produce when sown an unsatisfactory growth. The character of the crop is greatly influenced by the quality of the seed used, and to obtain the best results it should have its germinating power unimpaired, so that when placed in the soil the young plants may make a prompt and vigorous start. Hence it is very important that farmers should ascertain whether the grain they are holding for seed possesses the vitality necessary to produce a good crop.

By instruction of the Honourable Minister of Agriculture, provision has been made whereby the vitality of seed can be ascertained without cost to the individual, and any farmer in the Dominion, who may have any varieties which he desires to have tested can get the information he seeks, by forwarding to the Director of the Experimental Farms, Ottawa, samples of such grain or seeds. Samples may be sent free through the mail and an ounce or two is sufficient for the purpose. About two weeks are required to complete a test. It is hoped that all who desire to avail themselves of the provision offered will send in their samples early so that the work may be completed in good season.

PAN-AMERICAN AND CANADA.

The Exposition at Buffalo will be of Great Benefit to Canadians.

FROM THE TORONTO, ONT. SATURDAY NIGHT.

Those who will make up the main body who pass through the gates of the Pan-American will be people of considerable means, many of them coming from a long distance, and all of them prepared to put in four or five days seeing the sights. As the majority of these people who are not Canadians have never been in Canada, they are unlikely to return home without saying that they have visited the Dominion. If they do this they will see Niagara Falls, take a ride on Lake Ontario, and come to Toronto, take a hack, ride around town for a couple of hours, return to Buffalo, and finally to their homes, firmly convinced that they have seen everything we have. This will not be accomplished without some effort on Toronto's part, and an organization should be effected good and early for the distribution of literature showing Toronto's attractions either in the center, southern and western centers of the population, or by agreements amongst the railways and steamboats, on the trains which carry the excursionists to Buffalo.

The report of the Board of Managers of the Lake Carriers' Association shows an increase of eighty thousand tons in the tonnage reported in the association. "With two exceptions," says the report, "the tonnage of association now includes all the fleets of importance on the lakes."

The Norwegian steamer Peter Jehsen came in to St. John, N.B., Wednesday with the first United States bituminous coal ever known to have been imported. The cargo of 5185 tons was consigned to the Dominion railway, and is part of the recent purchase of one hundred thousand tons.

Major W. Hamilton Merritt, of Toronto, who served with Brabant's Horse in the South Africa campaign in a letter to Lord Strathcona, written in December from Nice, where he was recuperating, offered the War Office to raise a regiment of Light Horse in Canada for service in South Africa. Lord Strathcona has forwarded the offer to the Militia Department.

The councilmen of Buffalo on Wednesday afternoon concurred in the resolution of the lower house providing that the governor-general of Canada and the presidents or the chief executive officers of the republics and countries of the western hemisphere whose governments have officially decided to participate in the Pan-American exposition be invited by the city of Buffalo to attend the exposition and to be the guests of the city during their visit.

A protest has been filed against the election of G. R. Maxwell, M. P. for Burrard.

Joseph Martin, M.L.A., who recently underwent a somewhat serious operation in St. Paul's Hospital, Vancouver, is sufficiently recovered to be out again, but is temporarily compelled to walk with the aid of crutches.

Richard James, assis't postmaster of Liverpool, who played an important part in arranging the present mail service between New York and Liverpool, died Tuesday. Mr. James was well known in many of the American cities, which he frequently visited.

Seventeen prominent merchants of Copenhagen have asked the government for assistance in a scheme for investing Danish capital in business in the West Indies. The government has put the matter in the hands of the parliamentary financial committee.
