Grip is epidemic in Montreal.
Chatham will have a new binder twine factory

Ex-Governor Mount of Indiana dropped dead.

A dinner was given at the Rideau Club, Ottawa in honor of Col. Buchan Eva Gauthier, a three-year-old child, fell from a window in Montreal and was killed.

West Hastings Conservatives have asked H. Corby, M.P., to reconsider his resignation.

Arnold Boecklin, the most famous of contemporary Swiss painters, died Wednesday in Florence.

An explosion at the Koenig Ludwig mine, at Recklinghausen, Westphalia, has caused the death of ten persons.

The Montreal Board of Trade has approved of the government's proposal to improve the navigation of French River.

Hon. R. R. Dobell expects to leave England for Canada about the 19th inst. He may, however, be detained until later.

George Wisner, of Norfolk, Ont., private R.C.R., died Wednesday morning at the Halifax hospital. He was 26 years of age.

The London Times says the Imperial government will not accept the United States senate's amendments to the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

The Manchester Guardian learns that the depression which affected the Queen during the early stages of the war in South Africa has returned.

There was a fire in the pathological museum of the university of Berlin Thursday. Prof Virchow's collection of skeletons and other valuables was damaged.

A gift of \$40,000 has just been made to the Syracuse, N.Y., University by John D. Archbold, of New York, on condition that a like amount be raised by other friends of the institution.

Robert Philip, premier and treasurer of Queensland, asserted Friday that the colony was prepared to contribute its proportion of ten thousand additional troops for South Africa.

Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt and his wife arrived in Montreal Thursday evening by the Delaware and Hudson from New York. They intend spending a few days in Montreal and Quebec.

Reforms are impending in the uniforms of the German army. The familiar Prussian blue tunic is to be replaced by a greyish brown garment, and bright buttons are to be replaced by dull ones.

Roger Atkinson, superintendent of rolling stock of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has left the employ of the company, and has been succeeded by E. A. Williams, formerly mechanical superintendent of the Soo line.

The passengers of the steamer Lake Ontario, which arrived Thursday evening from Liverpool, were closely inspected by the United States immigration commissioners at Halifax. The Zionist lacemakers were not discovered.

The Oswego Health Board last night ordered a general vaccination of school children and teachers. Physicians to do the work were appointed and schools ordered closed for two weeks. No cases have as yet developed here.

The British steamer Blenheim, nineteen days out from Hamburg for New York, arrived at Halifax Thursday afternoon, short of coal. Very rough weather was encountered nearly the whole of the passage. She is load with sugar.

The mayor of Nice declares he will not interfere with the bull fights scheduled for January 27, providing the law prohibiting the killing or maiming of animals in such fights is observed. An arena capable of accommodating 4000 persons has been completed.

The condition of Mr. Justice Rose, who is suffering from pneumonia was last night critical. Dr. W. P. Caven stated that both lungs are now affected. His lordship has however, a strong constitution, and his friends are hopeful that he will pull through.

A Qu Appelle despatch says the Farmers' Milling Company's mill and elevator at Fort Saskatchewan was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon with 40,000 bushels of wheat. The loss, exclusive of the wheat, will reach \$25,000, partly covered by insurance.

Walter Canden, of 169 Sumach street, Toronto, who drives a wagon for the Taylor Safe Works, was passing along Front street Thursday afternoon and when in front of the Queen's Hotel, a trolley wire, which street railway employes were fixing, fell and struck his horse. The force of the current killed the horse instantly. Canden himself was struck by the wire, but escaped unhurt.
