

NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

The Welland Canal will be opened on April 22.

Dr. Coll Sinclair, Aylmer, has been nominated by the Liberals of East Elgin for the Provincial House.

A deputation of temperance men urged the Premier of Manitoba to take the Liquor Act appeal to the Privy Council.

John Schofield, a prominent member of the Methodist church choir in Brandon, has been arrested on a charge of bigamy.

E. Borland, of Tilsonburg, has received an order from St. Petersburg, Russia, for a number of his celebrated trotting sulkies.

Amy Parks, a three-year-old child was burned to death at Waverly, N.Y. Her clothing caught fire while she was playing near a stove.

The continuous decline in Scotch pig iron prices having reached a ruinous level is said to be the result of the formation of the steel trust in the United States. It is claimed that the makers are alarmed at the prospects.

Hamilton retail merchants will urge upon the Government that the Police Court be made a court for the collection of small debts, the Division Court being too expensive for the collection of such sums as \$25 and under.

George M. Foster, formerly cashier of the South Danvers National Bank of Peabody, Mass., pleaded guilty before United States Commissioner Fisk to the misappropriation of \$21,000 of the funds of the bank.

The anniversary of Paardeberg was celebrated by the Montreal members of the contingent who were present at the battle, Majuba day. The soldiers held a reunion at the drill hall and related their experiences on the memorable day.

A deputation from the Ontario Historical Society waited upon Mr. Ross the other day, to ask \$1,000 for memorial tablets on historic spots and an increase from \$500 to \$1000 in the grant for the publication of historical documents.

James Ross, of St. Martins, N.B., was presented with an address and an arm chair by the County Council last week in recognition of his great age. He was born June 18, 1790, and is therefore 111 years old. He enjoys good health.

W. H. Mains has been appointed chief of the provincial police, whose duty it is to keep the peace along the Niagara frontier, succeeding the late Thomas H. Young. Mains was prominently connected with the Crown's case against the Welland Canal dynamiters.

A largely signed London petition has been presented to Col. Leys, M. L. A., praying him to urge upon the provincial government the repeal of the law which allows the slaughter of deer in the water. It is urged that in no other country in the world does such an inhuman law exist.

Dr. Potts writes:—The Methodist century fund has reached \$1,200,000. This is not by any means a complete report, additional amounts are being sent to the office daily. At the earnest solicitation of ministers and laymen I have decided to keep the books open until the 15th of this month.

Ignatius Cockshutt, aged 88, died at Brantford on Friday last from pneumonia, surrounded by all the members of his family. Deceased was one of Brantford's most highly esteemed and respected citizens. He had accumulated considerable wealth and retired from his mercantile business some years ago. He was very liberal to the poor. He has been identified with all of Brantford's enterprises for years, always taking a deep interest in undertakings that would benefit the city.

Alliston Herald.—A young farmer living near Airlie bought a new cutter last week and took it home. In the yard where it was left for a short time there was a flock of sheep and a war-like ram, which, when the owner left to put his horses away, got up to have a good look at the shining thing. The ram saw his reflection in the shining back—found the reflection as bold and warlike as himself—and as each was looking for a fight, the fight began. When the owner returned he found the back of his new cutter battered to pieces.

The heirs of the Cline estate, a property of great value in Virginia, expects soon to receive each their share of the property in question. Over forty of the heirs met at the residence of Mr. T. D. Smith, Delhi Wednesday afternoon of last week, to consult with Mr. Simeon Cline, of Hamilton, one of the heirs, who has the matter in hand. There are over three hundred heirs altogether, but the property and money involved amounts to several millions, so there will be quite a fortune for each individual.—Canadian.

Chief Young Dead.

Thomas H. Young, chief of the Ontario police force of the Niagara frontier, died at three o'clock this morning at his residence at Center Niagara Falls. Mr. Young had been ailing for the past two years with cancer of the stomach. Chief Young was one of the ablest police officers Canada has ever known. It was he who detected Birchall when he attempted to claim Benwell's trunks, and who brought the Falls murder-er Day to justice.

The Hall of Fame.

Through this remarkable addition to the New York University has been made known throughout the world by the comments of newspapers, yet Chancellor MacCracken and those in the secret have steadily declined to announce the name of the donor of this building, which cost over \$200,000. According to Sarah K. Bolton, the biographer, the giver was Helen Gould. This is stated by Mrs. Bolton in the March Delineator, in an article on Helen Gould and her gifts.

Mr. W. H. Hoyle, M. P. P., has been chosen as the Conservative candidate for North Ontario.

At Havelock the coroner's jury returned Sharpe guilty of "wilful and premeditated murder," for the killing of Davis. The evidence showed that he had said, "I have fixed the man that stole my wife."

Canada has always made a profit on the silver and copper coinage. Last year the Government floated coins to the face value of \$519,000. The cost was \$233,538, and the profit \$285,461. A dollar's worth of silver coins costs the country 45 cents Copper coins to the value of \$38,000 were put out. They cost \$14,448. A dollar's worth of coppers cost 38 cents. But the same result would not be reached with gold. Gold coins must be worth their face value.
