Address and Presentation

Mr. D. Duff Presented With a Very
Handsome Chair by The Pupils
of Jarvis Public School.

A very pleasing event, mingled
with regret, took place in the Jar-
vis school last Friday, when a large
number of pupils, parents and
friends assembled to do honor to
the departing teacher, Mr. D.
Duff, who has gone to Cayuga after
several years of faithful work as
principal of the Jarvis Public School.
The scholars had prepared an excel-
lent program of songs, recitations
and dialogues, which were rendered
in a manner which did credit to
themselves as well as their teachers,
and was much appreciated by those
present. At the close of that part
of the program Mr. Duff was pre-
sented with a handsome leather
covered chair on behalf the pupils,
accompanied by the following ad-
dress:—

Jarvis, March 8th, 1901.

Mr. DUFF:
Dear Teacher,—We, the pupils of
Jarvis school, hereby take this op-
portunity of expressing our sincere
regret for your departure from
among us. About seven years ago
you came here a stranger to most of
us and during the time of your so-
jour here you have won the esteem
and friendship of not only your
pupils but of the whole community.
These seven years, we are proud to
say, have been through your efforts
not only elevated the minds of your
pupils but have made this school the
envy of the county. We feel grate-
ful to you for your unceasing efforts
and constant attention to the welfare
of your pupils. You have inspired
within us by precept and example a
desire to seek knowledge. We also
feel grateful to you for the influence
you leave behind. As we go out
into the world to do for ourselves
we find your teachings of great
value and as fond memory brings
the thoughts of these pleasant days
around us we always feel indebted
to you. As a token of our appreci-

some way besides in mere words
that we feel grateful to you. As you
go to your new home be assured
that you carry with you the best
wishes of every pupil of this school
and may success crown your efforts

for some time.

for plaintiffs, T. Slight for defend-

account. Settled in Court. J. Y.
Murdoch for plaintiff, Defendant in
person.

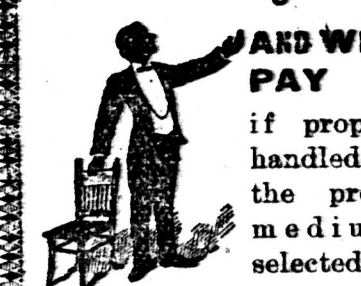

The Jarvis Public School.

Mr. EDITOR.—One of the greatest losses that
Jarvis as a community has ever suffered ap-
pears to be likely to come to pass unless some
vigorous action is taken at once to prevent the
consummation of what can only be regarded as
a piece of the worst folly ever entertained by
thinking people.

The resignation of Mr. Duff as principal was
a distinct loss to the school but not an irre-
parable one, but the allowance of the higher
class of work done by him to be discontinued
shows on the part of our Trustees a shortsight-
edness that does their intelligence no credit.

That the school that for years has been
known as the best public school in the county
should be allowed to descend to the level of a
country school is a matter for the serious con-
sideration on the part of the residents of the
section. At a considerable expense a building
has been erected that is in every way a credit
to the intelligence of the people of the section,
and to allow one room of that to be shut up (as
I am informed is the present intention of the
Trustees) would be disastrous to the best in-
terests of the community. I am very well
assured that the Trustees can have no knowledge

of the feeling of the section if they suppose for
one moment that they are ready to reduce
the school to the ordinary level for the sake of
saving a few dollars in salary. If one man will
not undertake the higher classes that Mr. Duff
had at so much trouble organized, there are
plenty of others who will gladly do so and the
people should make no uncertain sound in
letting their wishes be known to the Trustees.

It is a very easy matter to let the school go
down in reputation but a much more difficult
matter to build it up.

A suggestion was made some time ago in
your columns that a Business Men's Association
should be formed in the village and I think it a
pity that some definite action along that line
had not been taken for then they as a body
could have been able to exercise some influence
in this matter and perhaps to bring some
pressure to bear on our Trustees and make
them realize the very grave mistake they are
making.

It is not yet too late to save the credit of
the school and I earnestly hope that the matter
will receive the attention which it deserves and
that all good citizens and all desirous of ad-
vancing the best interests of the community will
unite in a determined effort to prevent the
great wrong that is in prospect of being accom-
plished. Thanking you for the use of so much
