Proclamation.

Dated March 5th, 1901.

In accordance with the Regu
lations of the Provincial Health Act.
All children attending school and
all persons who have not been
vaccinated within the past seven
years are required to attend before
a medical practitioner within seven
days from this date and be vaccinat
ed. All persons failing to comply
with this regulation will render
themselves liable to the penalties
provided by the Act. By order
Local Board of Health.

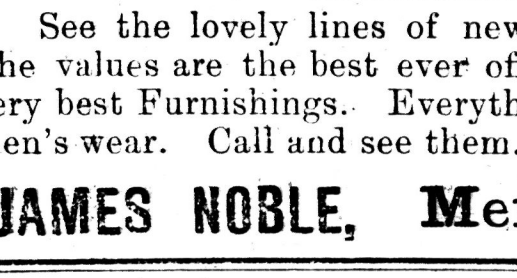
