### Beet Root Sugar.

Just now, in this part of the country, reliable information in respect of the beet root sugar industry is valuable. In writing to a friend in Hamilton, the engineer who made the plans for one of the Bay City, Michigan, beet root sugar refineries gives this information:

"First of all, about the farmer. He should not grow beets, as it is not good to grow too many beets, as it is not good to grow beet on the same ground for two consecutive seasons. If he has a 20 acre farm he should grow five acres of beets, or in that proportion. Some farmers have got 22 tons to the acre. As far as I can learn one can raise about \$60 worth of beets to the acre on an average, but it costs about \$30 of that for expenses, such as planting, weeding, etc. The farmer drives his beets to the factory. A basketful is taken out of his cart, cleaned and tested. The saccharine contained in that goes for his cart load. His cart load of beets are cleaned and weighed. They have been paying \$5 a ton for beets having 12 per cent of saccharine, and more in proportion. There has been a great deal of dissatisfaction here, the farmers not thinking they got just weight. We have three factories here now and a fourth is contemplated. It takes \$1,000 capital for every ton of beets used in a day. For instance, if you use 400 tons a day you must have \$400,000 capital. If you use 600 tons you must have \$600,000 capital."

### Important Libel Suit.

Toronto, March 23.—The North American Life Assurance Company, with its head office in this city, has decided to put the machinery of the courts in motion to prevent the circulation of alleged false statements regarding its rates to insurers, and to recover damages for previous alleged false representations. Writs for \$5,000 damages for alleged libel have been issued against the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Co. and its superintendent, George F. Johnston and it is said a number of other suits for the same amount will be commenced against other companies and their agents. Messrs. Kerr, Davison & Grant are acting for the plaintiffs.

### Had A Very Close Call.

Two Sleepers on the Lehigh Valley Express Jump the Track at the Falls.

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 21.—While No. 3 Lehigh Valley west-bound express, due at Suspension Bridge at 6.45 a.m., and running on time, was crossing at the east end of the steel arch bridge, on the N.Y.C. tracks this morning, the two sleepers on the rear of the train were derailed and went into the ditch. The air brakes were immediately applied and the train was stopped within a few yards. No one was seriously injured but all the passengers in the two sleepers got a bad shaking up. One gentleman had his nose somewhat disfigured, while another had a rib fractured. The cause of the accident is supposed to have been a defective switch. The passengers in the derailed sleeper were transferred, and after forty-five minutes delay the train left for the west over the G. T. R. Quite a number of people were aboard the

## WOULD BOTH DIE TOGETHER

A Madman Attempts Wife Murder Near Dunnville.

And Then Commits Suicide—The Woman May Recover—He Had Acted Strangely of Late Years—Mrs. Lynch's Story of the Assault.

Dunnville, March 21.—As Mrs. McKay was driving past Alex Lynch's farm near here last evening, she noticed a bloody smock hanging from a tree near the barn. Thinking this strange, and seeing no sign of life about the place, Mrs. McKay thought she would investigate further. Going to the house, a terrible sight met her eyes. Lying unconscious on the sofa was Mrs. Lynch, her head terribly lacerated and bruised, and her hair matted and her clothes stained with blood. In the barn another and still more horrible sight was in store for her. There she found Mr. Lynch quite dead, with his throat cut, and the bloody knife still clutched in his hand.

A messenger was dispatched to notify Dr. McCallum, the corner, but he was out of town. Dr. Pringle was then called, and he dressed Mrs. Lynch's wounds and restored her to consciousness. To him she told the following story:—Her husband had been acting strangely of late. Yesterday morning, after they had milked the cows and here still in the barn, Mr. Lynch took the king bolt from a wagon, and saying they would both die together, seized her and beat her with it until he thought she was dead. Then taking off his bloody smock and hanging it on a tree outside the barn, he took his jack knife, which he had previously sharpened for the purpose, and stabbed himself in the neck, severing the jugular vein and exclaiming in a few minutes. Upon regaining consciousness Mrs. Lynch staggered to the house, and fell upon the sofa, where she remained without fire or attention until found in the afternoon. Dr. Pringle found her head literally covered with wounds, and thinks there is no chance of her recovery. Mr. Lynch was comfortably well off, and is thought to have been insane when he committed the deed.

### Experimental Union Field Tests For 1901.

The members of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union are pleased to state that for 1901 they are again prepared to distribute into every Township of Ontario materials for experiments with fertilizers, fodder crops, roots, grains, grasses, and clovers. Upwards of three thousand Ontario farmers conducted the co-operative experiments upon their own farms last year.

The material will be forwarded in the

order in which the applications are received until the limited supply is exhausted. It might be well for each applicant to make a second choice for fear the first could not be granted.


