A case of smallpox has broken out in the village, the victim being Mr. J. W. Taylor, proprietor of the Commercial Hotel. Mr. Taylor, has been confined to his bed for the past week, but it was not until yesterday that it became known that it was a case of smallpox. The case was reported at once to the provincial board of health and the local board of health have taken the necessary precautions to prevent the spread of the disease. The hotel has been quarantined and the premises placarded. It is not known how Mr. Taylor contracted the disease. This is the first case of smallpox in this village for forty years.

Dr. J. A. Langrill, an Alderman of the City of Hamilton, who has been in Australia for some months in the interests of the Independent Order of Foresters, was entertained at a social in the rooms of the order at Sydney, N. S. W., prior to his departure from Australia. After a short musical programme the chairman, on behalf of the brethren, presented Bro. He had reached the railway bridge when a fast Wabash train came along, and his horse became frightened and started to run, and in turning the corner the buggy was upset and the old gentleman thrown out. The horse succeeded in getting loose from the buggy, doing considerable damage to the harness and rig, besides receiving some bad gashes on his hind legs.
