Tankage as a Food for Pigs.

In view of the rapid extension of swine growing, and the consequent establishment of porkpacking houses in all parts of the country, a recent bulletin (No 90) of the Indiana Experiment Station, regarding the value, as a food for swine of the packing house bye-product, known as tankage, may be of interest. According to the above bulletin, tankage offers considerable advantage as a feeding material for pigs. It contains a high per cent of protein, and grain or bye-product of mills. It costs about \$25.00 a feed rich in protein, to the corn, per ton lald down at my home, and contains double the protein found in oil meal, and is a very much better feed for pigs. It seems to be a perfect substitute for milk, a pound of the tankage costing less than a cent and a quarter, and having a feeding value equal to about three gallons of skimmed milk. A mixture of thirty pounds of corn to 10 lbs. each of wheat middlings and tankage, makes a very well balanced ration for pigs up to four months old. A very good ration for older pigs or hogs may be made by strong, penetrating liniment to drive reducing the middlings and tankage out the pain. A quantity of tankage was supplied the Station at the request of the Director, by Swift & Co., of We have a large stock of the latest styles Chicago, for feeding swine. This tankage was especially prepared for the purpose being made from "bones and meat taken from the cutting room, tanked immediately and pressed and dried." A representative of the above firm wrote that "If tankage can be used at all for swine feeding, it must be specially prepared. The writer's opinion is that no tankage, that contains any part of the intestines ac., should be used for this purpose." A sample of this tankage, showed the following com-

To determine something of the value of tankage in a swine feeding ration, an experiment with a fairly

uniform lot of pigs was begun and continued for 127 days. The animals fed consisted of 16 head of young pigs, divided into lots of four each. These were all purebred animals, and averaged about sixty pounds each at the beginning of the test. The food used were as follows:-Lot 1....10 parts of pure corn meal

and 1 part tankage. Lot 2.... 5 parts pure commeal. and I part tankage. Lot 3.... Pure corn meal only.

Lot 4....10 parts of a mixture, in equal proportions of pure corn meal and shorts, and one part tankage.

The above results show that the influence of the tankage in supplying protein to what would otherwise have been a very carbonaceous ration, was extremely beneficial in the growth of pigs, as well as in the financial results. With Lot No. 4 there is a difference of nearly two cents between cost of feed per pound of gain, and in the price received per pound live weight, while the difference in this respect with lot No 3 cornfed is very slight indeed.

The firmness of the flesh of lot No 3 was not quite as good as that of the tankage fed lots. This was fairly noticeable

The condition of these experimental fed pigs during the feeding was of much interest. Those of lots No. 1, 2, and 4, where tankage was fed, had noticeably silkier coats of hair, and the appearance of the skin was fresher and more mellow an amount of phosporic acid that than that of the corn fed lot.
