NEWS OF THE WEEK

Items of Interest From All Points
in the Dominion.

The C.P.R. will build 200 miles of
new railway in Manitoba next sum-
mer.

A daily steamship service between
Ottawa and Kingston will be begun
in 1903.

A farmer near Portage la Prairie,
Man., has already seeded 25 acres
with wheat.

The double-tracking of the Grand
Trunk line west of London, Ont.,
will begin soon.

Mr. Leonard, the new member for
Laval, has been appointed Conserva-
tive whip for the province of Quebec.

The Orillia board of trade has
passed a resolution in favor of free
trade within the empire, with a duty
on foreign goods.

The Tilsonburg, Lake Erie & Pacific
railway company is applying to
parliament for power to extend the
line to the Georgian bay.

The transport Victorian, with the
second section of the third Canadian
mounted rifles on board, arrived at
Cape Town Thursday afternoon.

Sir Charles Tupper and Lady Tupper
have received invitations to at-
tend King Edward's coronation.
They will be accompanied by Miss
Tupper.

It is stated that a firm in the
United States has contracted for 24-
000 tons of feldspar, to be delivered
within the next three years. The
feldspar will be mined chiefly at
points on the Kingston and Pem-
broke railroad.

It has been discovered that a num-
ber of counterfeit five-pound bank
of England notes are in circulation,
and that a number of people have
been deceived by the skill with
which the engraving and paper have
been imitated.

Thomas A. Browne, postmaster of
London, while at the curling rink
was seized with a fit and expired in
a few minutes afterwards. Mr.
Browne was appointed postmaster
on the retirement of the late Mr.
Dawson, about eighteen months ago.

Detective Burrows, Toronto, went
to Simcoe, Thursday, and brought
back William Lambert, of Port
Dover, cousin of the man sent to
Kingston penitentiary last Monday
for bigamy and theft. The youth
is charged with stealing a gold
collar button and about twenty
handkerchiefs from George Ramage.

It is reported that the Chinese
commission is divided as to the head
tax which should be imposed on
Chinese immigrants, the majority
urging \$500, the minority \$300.
The present tax is \$100. The Jap-
anese will not be interfered with,
as the government of that country has
passed regulations restricting the
emigration of Japanese.

The halibut express, comprising
nine cars of fresh halibut, one car of
Puget Sound salmon, and one car of
Squamish Valley hops, has left Van-
couver for Boston. This is the first
through fish train to run from the
Pacific to the Atlantic. It will
make the same time as the passenger
express, and the fish will be landed
in Boston on Monday morning.

A seat on the Montreal stock ex-
change was sold to L. G. Beaubien
for \$15,000, the highest price yet
paid. A few months ago a seat sold
at \$13,000, up to then the highest.
The seat sold is one of the five held
by the corporation, and the amount
paid was the upset price placed on
all of them. A movement is on foot
to exclude attorneys from the floor
of the exchange.

Further reports are published in
London regarding the Australian dem-
onstration, in which Premier Barton
and the leader of the opposition
took part, supporting the imperial
policy in South Africa, and denoun-
cing German slanders. The Star
prints a leader, asking when
the Canadian parliament means to
follow the Australian example.

In Caistor township, Lincoln
county, and Canborough township,
Haldimand county, smallpox, which
has been prevalent for some time, is
increasing. The provincial health
authorities believe this to be due to
a dispute as to the disease among
the local medical men, and will take
matters in hand themselves and
adopt stringent measures to try to
prevent the spread of the disease.

The Conservatives have decided
to protest Robert Beith's election to
the federal parliament in West
Durham, and have retained the ser-
vices of Wallace Nesbitt. At the
general elections Mr. Thornton was
returned, but was subsequently un-
seated on a technicality. In the re-
cent bye-election Mr. Beith was
elected by a small majority in a con-
test in which over 90 per cent. of the
votes on the voters' lists was polled.

It is said in Boer circles that if
Messrs. Wolmarans and Weesels,
after investigating the situation in
the United States, advise Mr. Kruger
that a tour of the United States
would be beneficial to the Boer
cause, the Boer president will over-
come his aversion to a long trip, and
undertake the journey. Mr. Kruger
appears to be in excellent physical
condition.

A most interesting point is to be
decided at the next sitting of the
county court at Brantford, as the
result of an action that has been en-
tered against the estate of the late
Delos Forbes by Mrs. Mary Leemin.
The plaintiff kept a boarding house
on Dalhousie street, and she claims
\$200 damages, sustained by reason
of the fact that the late Mr. Forbes
boarded with her. Mr. Forbes was
a sufferer from consumption, she
alleges. As soon as the other board-
ers found out the cause of his illness
they left the house. She spoke to
Mr. Forbes, she says, and he told
her that she should not suffer any
loss through him, and that she
should be recompensed.

The banquet tendered by the
opposition members of the Legisla-
ture to their leader, J. P. Whitney
in Toronto, on Thursday evening
last, was a great success. The com-
pany was made up largely of the
parliamentary delegation and the
presidents and secretaries of Con-
servative associations and candidates
for the legislature throughout the
province, and numbered nearly four
hundred. In addition to the guest
of the evening, there were such
prominent speakers as R. L. Borden,
the Dominion Conservative leader
and F. D. Monk, M. P., the Con-
servative leader in Quebec. Speeches
were also delivered by several mem-
bers of the legislature.

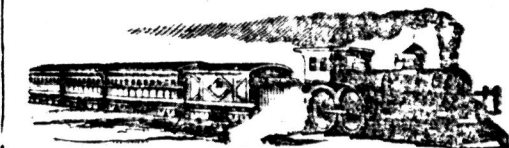
