Sentence on a Quintette of Mutineers in 1802.

From The Times of Jan. 18, 1802, reproduced in The Times of Jan. 17, 1902:

Sentence of the Naval Mutineers.

#### THE SENTENCE.

The prisoners were put to the bar, and the Judge Advocate, in the same form as upon the last Trial, read the Sentence, declaring Allen, Taylor, Dixon, Riley and Simmonds GUILTY of the Charges against them, and awarding Judgment of Death, and Comayne in part guilty, and ordering him to receive 200 lashes.

The Prisoners all exclaimed: "The Lord's will be done!"

Taylor—"I hope we shall be allowed time to make our peace with God."

President—"It does not rest with the Court; it depends upon a superior power."

Dixon requested Admiral Campbell would come to him and hear what he would wish to say. The Admiral immediately went towards him. "Look at this paper," said Dixon, while the tears flowed from him. "I have a wife and a child; see if this will have any effect in their favor when I am gone. The Lord have mercy on my soul!" It was a will, bequeathing his property to his wife. He declared his innocence of some of the charges against him, but confessed he was the man who unshipped the main ladder.

Taylor gave the Judge Advocate his will in favor of James Brand, a Seaman on board the Temeraire. He was assured it would be delivered safe.

The Court immediately dissolved.
