Police Court.

There was a session of the police court held last Saturday morning presided over by C. E. Bourne, J. P. The defendant in the case was Jacob Abraham, a foreign junk dealer, who was brought up on a charge preferred by the Jarvis police commissioners for alleged cruelty to a horse. The animal had been shipped from Port Credit the Monday before and arrived here on Tuesday. Abraham, it appears, accepted the horse under protest, but did so in order to get another horse and some stuff mentioned in the shipping bill. After being taken from the car, the horse too weak to stand, was left lying in the sun until the commissioners took it in charge and had it placed in a barn and cared for. Owing to the defendant's lawyer not being able to appear the case was adjourned until Tuesday, but was settled in the meantime by the defendant paying a fine and the costs. J. Y. Murdoch looked after the case for the police commissioners.

Got Back at the Constable

A. B. Tufford, village constable of Deamsville, appeared before Magistrate Riggins last week on a charge of being drunk and disorderly on Thursday evening last. The officer had imbibed too freely and he created a disturbance. Tufford pleaded guilty and was fined \$2 and costs, or \$4 in all. The complainant in the case was James O. Karr, who was before the magistrate some time ago on a similar charge laid by Tufford. Karr spotted the constable on Thursday evening while the latter was at the height of his jubilation, and remembering the grudge he bore him, took the necessary steps to ensure the officer appearing before the magistrate. Deamsville is a local option town.

Caledonia Sachem—"Jack" Miller, who pitched for Jarvis about three years against Caledonia here and scored a shut-out with Fishery pitching for the home team, made a remarkable record last week. Mrs. J. J. Murray Dead.

Mrs. John J. Murray, wife of Cayuga's worthy reeve, passed away on Friday last. Mrs. Murray's maiden name was Justina Allen, daughter of the late Michael Allen, of Toronto. She was but 32 years of age and was united in marriage to Mr. Murray on June 30th, 1903. The deceased lady had been ailing for some time, but only a few weeks ago did her illness take a serious turn, and even then her husband had not given up hope of her recovery.

The funeral on Monday to St. Stephen's church was very largely attended. The high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. Father Doyle, who also officiated at the grave. A brief and impressive sermon was preached by Rev. Father O'Leary. The pall-bearers were: Edward Murray, James Murray, William Murray and Thomas Doyle, of Cayuga; Dr. W. O'Hara, of Toronto, and Thomas Kirk, of Hamilton. The deceased was formerly of Toronto and closely associated and widely acquainted with the musical circles of that city and of Hamilton. Three young children are now bereft of a loving mother's care, namely, Mary, Wilfrid and Justina, aged four, two and a half and one and a quarter years, respectively.

A special session of the town council was held on Saturday evening at which a resolution of sympathy was passed. Mr. Murray also received many expressions of sympathy from brother members of the county council, from associations in business and other friends.

As the result of the visit of Dr. Stark of Brampton, to Brantford Tuesday, following the recent cases of rabies, ten dogs were seized by the police and destroyed. The child who was bitten last week has been hurried to New York for treatment and the animal's movements were traced. It had been fighting and inflicted wounds on at least a dozen other dogs. Strict measures are being upon the spot as a precaution against a serious outbreak.
