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

A particularly severe electrical storm passed over St. Thomas district Tuesday. Lightning struck the tower of the city hall, damaging it considerably and stunning Janitor Lousel, Policemen Geddes and Fairbrother. The barns and outbuildings of George Moore, Southwold, were destroyed by fire and his house saved only by hard work.

### Report of Presbytery.

Hamilton Presbytery, that was appointed to examine into the state of the Drummondville church and some allegations that were made concerning Rev. F. C. Harper, was laid before the Presbytery Tuesday afternoon at a special meeting.

The committee reported that Mr. Harper had been indiscreet, but placed themselves on record as being convinced that there was no stain on his moral character. His resignation tendered recently was accepted. The press was not admitted to the meeting, but a statement was given out afterwards, in which after having outlined the general causes of dissatisfaction in Drummondville, the committee gave the following finding:

"We have discovered that the alleged causes are true ones, and that the course pursued by the pastor has been exceedingly indiscreet, and has undoubtedly and with too much cause laid the foundation for the unpleasant and unfavorable rumors which are afloat." Then follows a statement that the matter was discussed by the lay and clerical members of the Presbytery, the result of which was a resolution expressing satisfaction that nothing had been adduced that reflected on Rev. Mr. Harper's moral character and the acceptance of his resignation.

A call from the Drummondville church has been extended to Rev. Mr. Johnston, of Lynedoch and Carholme, and it was ordered that this be forwarded to him.

The government is taking steps to stamp out rabies in western Ontario.

The cigaret may not now be sold in Minnesota. The new state law prohibiting the sale went into effect Sunday, and it is now illegal to put them on the market.

Early Tuesday morning during a heavy thunderstorm the residence of William Allen Smith, near Garners' Corners, Ancaster township, was struck by lightning and completely destroyed, together with the contents. The flames spread to the barn, which was burned to the ground, and four horses perished. The family were asleep when the fire broke out, and they had to get out of the house quickly. The loss, which will be heavy, is only partly covered by insurance.

A sad ending of what promised two years ago to be a happy married life took place in police court at Port Colborne Monday, when Geo. D. Warden, who was charged with assaulting his wife and threatening to kill her, signed an agreement to part from her forever. This is Warden's third wife. His first wife is dead. His second wife is living in the States, but he claims to have secured a divorce from her in Montana. Mrs. Warden had one previous matrimonial experience, her first husband being Robert Cook, deceased. Defendant was found guilty on the charge, but, in compliance with the wish of Mrs. Warden, sentence was suspended.

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
