### Newsy Miscellany

Caledonia high school has been treated to a new metallic roof in addition to interior improvements.

The contract for furnishing material for the new Courtage bridge was awarded to J. J. Winger and M. Anderson, road division master.

It is said that the buying of the Hagersville cider, planing and saw mills by A. Bailey will necessitate the removal of several Springvale residents.

A severe electric storm early last week did considerable damage in Seneca township. Barns belonging to John Abby and Wm. Hamilton were burned with all their contents.

The residents of Port Dover were treated to a novel sight recently when a traction engine passed through the village having in tow four wagons, each laden with nearly one hundred skeps of bees, which were being taken to a nearby farm in readiness for the buckwheat bloom.

Wm. Reicheld's threshing engine, in charge of A. Lintal, of Rainham, broke through the bridge just east of Chesapeake one evening recently. Mr. Lintal jumped from the engine and received no injuries. The engine, which was taken out of the creek next day, was not very badly damaged.

For the first time since the Indian List went into force the authorities of London, Ont., have a whole family prohibited from going near hotels. The family includes Emmanuel Kelly, the father, Mary Kelly, the mother, Miss Julia, the daughter, and Thomas and Walter Kelly, the sons. Except for their weakness for liquor they are good citizens.

Little Bert Martin, the two-and-half-year-old child from Brantford, Ont., who was taken to the Pasteur Institute for treatment, having been bitten by a rabid dog some weeks ago, is entirely out of danger. He is taking the full Pasteur treatment which consists of one treatment a day for eighteen successive days. The little child has not shown any signs of affection and the treatment is being taken merely as a precaution.

Thirty head of cattle belonging to a farmer named Simons wandered through a defective fence on the farm between St. George and Paris, and bunched on the Grand Trunk track for the night. A freight crashed into them, killing 12 outright, and so badly injuring four more that they will be killed. A big gang of men was necessary to dig a trench a hundred feet long to bury the dead cattle where they fell alongside the track.

Frank Temple of Port Burwell, serving a month's imprisonment for fighting, escaped Saturday between 6 and 7 o'clock. He went down into the basement of the Court House with waste paper, and while the turnkey was waiting for him at the top of the stairs, he passed out of the cellar door into the yard adjoining the jail. A few steps took him through the gate to the street, and from there the way was open into the open country. Temple had but eleven days to serve, but was wanted in Wallaceburg on a more serious charge. He was wearing his prison clothes when he escaped.

### Fixed For Illegal Fishing.

Captain Alfred Hunter, game and fishing magistrate for Ontario, was in Hamilton last week, and tried two cases. One was that of Mr. Corey, of the Beach, who was charged with fishing with gill nets in the waters of the county of Halton, outside of his own limits, without a license. The case was to have been tried at Burlington, but Mr. Corey appeared at the Waldorf hotel, and considering the circumstances, asked for leniency. Magistrate Hunter fined him \$25. The question of the confiscation of 1,200 yards of net was reserved. Mr. Corey will be allowed to continue fishing in his own limits.

The second case was that of H. Chapman, charged with fishing with a drag net and catching minnows for bait. He pleaded ignorance of the law and was fined \$5. A license will be issued to him so that he can carry on business according to law.

Inspector Kerr announced that the department will strictly enforce the law, especially in and around Hamilton, by its own magistrate.

### Bees And Poppy Bed.

"Numerous honey bees have been for some days puzzling me by their extraordinary conduct in my flower garden," said a suburban dweller, and now a New York friend of mine who is wise in the ways of the world has revealed to me the reason for their conduct and it has pained me deeply.

"I grew a big bed of poppies this summer and they are now in abundant and brilliant bloom. When the poppies first appeared bees were working all about the garden on flowers of various kinds. Then by and by I noticed that they were abandoning these and taking possession of the poppy beds in swarms. They seemed not only to seek the poppies exclusively, but none of them showed inclination to quit them when once at work among them. Bees hovered about the bed in frantic efforts to get places in which they were constantly occupied by other bees, and these were just as eagerly struggling to keep their places in the flower cups against those trying to get in.

"A peculiar drowsy, droning hum was constant about the bed, making you sleepy to hear it. It was evident from the persistence with which the bees assailing that poppy bed clung to their places or reluctantly now and then gave them up that whoever it was who owned them wasn't getting much work done in his hives, and knowing the reputation of bees for being busy and improving each shining hour I wondered more and more at this singular lapse from duty. Then one day I was showing the strange sight to my New York friend and voicing my wonder at what it all meant. He gazed at it a moment in a stony and cynical sort of way and then said:

"What does it all mean? Why, it's plain enough. Each and every one of those poppies is a natural opium joint and the bees have hit up the dope and can't get away from it. That's all it means," said he.

"I was sorry indeed to hear it, for it pained me deeply to learn that the bee, the busy bee, ever held up as an example of all that should be emulated and admired, should be thus prone to evil ways."—New York Sun.
