### Newsy Miscellany

The Campbell house, Caledonia, has been purchased by R. G. Freeman, late proprietor of the Union hotel, who will take possession next month.

Ernest Ramsay, a young farmer living near Alvinston, was caught in a reaper and so badly mangled that his recovery is impossible. The accident was caused by Ramsay falling from the machine.

The Dain Manufacturing Company of Ottumwa, Ohio, who have had an office at Preston, Ontario, have this week removed all their business from Preston to Welland, where they are erecting a large plant for the manufacture of hay presses, hay loaders, rakes, and other agricultural implements.

A large frame barn, on the premises of Thomas Patterson, on the outskirts of Thorold, was destroyed by a fire Thursday with a thousand dollars worth of lumber, one hundred chickens, forty rabbits, and three pigs. The fire is supposed to have been incendiary origin. The Thorold firemen tried to extinguish it, but their hose would only reach within 300 feet of the fire and was useless, and the firemen had to simply let the building go. The loss is \$5000, partly covered by insurance.

A disastrous fire occurred at Norwich Friday night, when the Oxford Flour mills was destroyed. The fire took place about 7.30, and was caused by a hot bearing, in the basement. It was not discovered until the flames had gained considerable headway. The mill was completely destroyed and also the elevator and about 6,000 bushels of wheat. The loss on the mill alone will be about \$15,000. The property is owned by J. J. Rank. Several times during the evening Allen's vinegar factory caught fire, but the good work of the firemen saved the building and its contents.

It is stated that the Township of Gainsboro' will ask for an injunction to prevent the Hydro-electric power line from taking possession of the highways of the township. The Hydro-electric people are having a great deal of trouble securing a right-of-way from farmers, and a number of farmers are taking legal advice to protect themselves. One farmer was offered \$400, and upon his refusal it was increased to \$200, and again increased to \$600, and finally \$850 was offered and accepted. There will be a great deal of trouble before the matter is settled.

### Orchard Chopped Down.

Lockport, N. Y., Aug. 15.—Over 125 three-year-old fruit trees in Jos. Rorundo's orchard were chopped down last night, supposedly by a member of the so-called Black Hand. From the tracks in the orchard, it is believed that one man did the job.

Rorundo, who is a wealthy Italian hotelkeeper at Hitching's Bridge, in the western part of the city, has had much trouble with Black Hand men. On August 7 last he received a letter demanding \$5,000. On April 5 last he received a similar letter demanding \$3,000. He paid no attention to it, and a few nights later a bullet whistled into his room.

Last October, following a demand for several thousand dollars, a decoy package was placed in the appointed spot, and Vinco Callbano, who came after the money, was shot by the police. He recovered and is now serving a prison sentence.

Spain reproduced the assessment of the Boughners of Windham township, Norfolk county, for the year 1809—one hundred years ago—from the assessment roll which hangs in the captain's museum as follows:

John Boughner, 145 acres, 30 cultivated, 1 grist mill, 1 round log house, 1 horse, 2 cows, 3 horned cattle, 1 swine, amount, £77, assessment 6s 6d.

Alexander Boughner, 102 acres, 10 cultivated, 2 yoke oxen, 1 cow, amount £31, assessment 2s 7d.

Martin Boughner, sr, 72 acres, 40 cultivated, 2 yoke oxen, 1 horse, 1 cow, amount £53 4s assessment 4s 10d.

Matthias Boughner, sr., 82 acres, 32 cultivated, brick house, 2 yoke oxen, 1 cow, 3 horned cattle, 2 swine, amount £98 4s, assessment 7s 4d.

Peter Boughner, 235 acres, 16 cultivated, 2 horses, 3 cows, 2 pigs, amount £65 10s, assessment 5s 5d.

Matthias Boughner, jr., 295 acres, 30 cultivated, 1 brick or stone house, 1 cow, 1 horned cattle, 1 swine, amount £307, assessment 5s 7d.

A careful comparison of the various assessments shows that the old-time assessors were as liable to err in their estimates as those of the present generation.
