The strongest argument against this form of publicity is the fact that it is contrary to public opinion. There is an ever growing sentiment against the defacing of scenery. It is not likely to be conducive to the popularity of an advertiser to have his advertisement stand between a passenger on a train and a beautiful landscape. Some architects have gone so far as to refuse to recommend for use in construction or furnishing any article which is advertised on sign boards. The Ontario Horticultural Society at its meeting is Toronto last month passed a resolution condemming the practise of despoling the countryside by the erection of these boards. The wise business man will be inclined to consider with great care the adoption of a policy which, it is evident is con-

trary to the judgement of a growing body of the community. There are numerous other forms of publicity—but the advertiser who tries them all usually comes back to the root and trunk of successful publicity—the newspaper.
