**Obituary.**

George S. Best, died at his residence in Buffalo on Friday evening, Dec. 10th, in his 62nd year.

Deceased was born in Walpole Township, Haldimand County. He farmed for many years in South Cayuga, conducted a general store in Upper for awhile, and then moved to Buffalo where he has resided ever since.

He married Miss Sarah Matlock, eldest daughter of the late Daniel Matlock, in 1870. She survives him, along with four children, namely, Daniel, Lewis, Mrs. Edward Krumm and Mrs. Geo. Siddall, all of Buffalo. Another son predeceased her. He also leaves four brothers, William of Cayuga, John of Dover, David of North Cayuga and Albert of Balmoral, also one sister, Mrs. Mary Vanderburgh of Hamilton.

The funeral took place on the following Monday, conducted by Mystic Lodge, I. O. O. F. Encampment of which he was an old and prominent member. Among those ing were a number of relatives and friends from Haldimand County.

**Found Dead In A Pond.**

St. Thomas, Dec. 26.—A coroner's jury at Waterford will investigate the mysterious death of William Schram, a farmer, aged 60, whose body was found by M. C. R. ice harvesters in the Waterford pond on Friday. Mr. Schram, who lives a mile north of the town, went to Brantford Saturday, Dec. 18th, and did some Christmas shopping, returning on the T. H. & H. train the same evening. At Waterford, for some reason or other, he boarded the M. C. R. train for the west, but was put off and walked back to Waterford. In crossing the bridge over the pond he evidently fell off, as his body was found partly submerged in the ice below the bridge. His head was above the water and his arms were thrown around one of the bridge supports. Doctors say he was not drowned but perished, and may have been in that position since Saturday night or Sunday. He had his gold watch and two hundred dollars, but the Christmas presents he bought in Brantford was gone.
