

### Tantalum.

Tantalum is a "rare metal" of slight improtance, the only practical use to which it is now known to be put being in making filaments for incandescent electric lamps. The efficiency of the tantalum lamp is greater than that of the carbon lamp, but somewhat less than that of the lamp with tungsten filaments. As more than 20,000 filaments of twenty candle power can be made from a pounde of tantalum, the market is not large. It is at present probably supplied by rich manganotantalates from Western Australia. Nn tanlum minerals are known to have been produced in the United States in 1908. according to F. L. Hess, whose report on various rare metals forms an advance chapter of "Mineral Resources of the United States, Calendar Year 1908," published by the Geological Survey. The tantalum used in the manufacture of lamps in this country is made in Germany and ported at a cost of \$300 a pound. Scientific American.


