## The Late Mrs. Snyder

The late Mrs. Snyder, who died  
in Hagersville at the home of her  
daughter, Mrs. Rodgers, was for  
many years a resident of this vicin-  
ity on the homestead now occupied  
by her son, Wallace Snyder, and  
was beloved by all who knew her  
for her kindness of heart and  
cheery good nature. She was in her  
eighty-fifth year having been born  
at St. Ann's, Ont., where she lived  
until her marriage to the late Gide-  
on Snyder, when they moved to the  
homestead in Woodhouse. Both  
Mr. and Mrs. Snyder were descen-  
dants of U. E. Loyalists, the Sny-  
ders and the Mingles, which was  
her maiden name, having come to  
Canada at the same time. Mr. Sny-  
der died seven years ago this Sep-  
tember. Three sons and one daugh-  
ter survive. They are Mrs. Rod-  
gers, of Hagersville; Wallace, of  
Woodhouse; Silas, of Walpole, and  
Gideon of this place.

The funeral was held on Satur-  
day last from Gideon Snyder's  
residence to Knox church for ser-  
vice and interment. The pallbearers  
were Robert McNeil, John Thomp-  
son, J. J. Parsons, Robert McIn-  
toch and John Jaques.

**Accident to Mrs. E. Park**

Those in Jarvis not already ac-  
quainted with the facts in con-  
nection will be sorry to learn of the  
serious accident which happened to  
Mrs. Ezra Park while visiting her  
niece in Walkerton. The following  
account appeared in the Bruce  
Times of June 24:

"While Mrs. Skelton and her  
aunt, Mrs. Park, were out driving  
in the West Ward on Tuesday even-  
ing last they came suddenly upon  
an auto mired in the mud near  
Mr. Dan Knappp's. At the sight  
of the auto, their horse, a spir-  
ited one, jumping into the ditch,  
upsetting the buggy and throwing  
the occupants heavily to the ground.

In the mix-up Mrs. Park had her  
arm broken, and was otherwise  
severely bruised and shaken up. Mrs.  
Skelton escaped unhurt, although  
she pluckily hung onto the horse  
and was dragged a considerable  
distance through the mud. She  
finally brought the horse to a stand-  
still, but not before their splendid  
rubber tired buggy was badly  
wrecked. The automobile was the  
property of a Toronto man, and  
about an hour previous to the ac-  
cident, had become disabled and was  
left by him on the roadside. We  
understand the latter is making  
arrangements to settle for the  
damages."
