### 'Specials for Horses

Show the Widespread Reputation  
of the Horse Show at the Ca-  
nadian National.

The special prizes offered in the  
breeding classes at the Canadian  
National Exhibition, Toronto, this  
year indicate the widespread repu-  
tation of the horse exhibit. The  
Ontario Jockey Club donate \$100  
to the thoroughbreds. Medals are  
offered in the Hackneys by the  
English Hackney Horse Society and  
the American Hackney Horse So-  
ciety. In the Clydesdales, Mr. Geo.  
A. Ferguson, of Surradale, Scot-  
land, gives an additional \$25 to the  
champion Stallion, while the Cly-  
desdales Association give specials  
of \$50 to the best Stallion, any age,  
and best Mare, any age. In Shires,  
the Shire Horse Society of England  
give a \$50 gold medal for the best  
Stallion or entire colt, and another  
of equal value for the best mare or  
filly. These are just a few of the  
many evidences of the world-wide  
reputation of the Horse Show.

Dr. P. E. Jones, who died at  
Hagersville last week, was an ex-  
Indian agent of the Mississaugas of  
the New Credit, a son of the cele-  
brated missionary and chief, the  
late Peter Jones, and a personal  
friend of the late Sir John A. Mac-  
donald. He was a life member of  
St. John's Chapter, Royal Arch  
Masons, Hamilton. The late doctor  
was a graduate of Queen's universi-  
ty, and a noted chess player. He at  
one time owned the largest collec-  
tion of Indian relics in the pro-  
vince, many of which are now to be  
seen at the Washington Institute.  
It was chiefly through his efforts  
that the claim of the Chippewa In-  
dians against the Dominion was  
admitted.
