Respected Resident at Rest

After only a few days of suffering
at the dawn of Thursday morning,
June 24, George Walker, one of
Walpole's most respected residents,
passed to his rest, surrounded by
most of his family, two of his sisters
and one brother. He leaves a wid-
ow, three sons, three daughters,
nineteen grandchildren and a large
circle of friends to mourn his re-
moval from their midst.

Born in the county of Lincoln,
England, on August 16, 1843, Mr.
Walker was within a few days
of attaining his sixty-sixth birthday.
When about fourteen years of age
he came with his parents to Canada
and worked on a farm with them
till his marriage to Miss Juliet Cul-
ver who proved a true helpmate to
him and who now survives him,
having during the past year under-
gone the triple bereavement of
mother, daughter and husband.

Mr. Walker was by occupation a
farmer. His genial nature, endeared
him to all who knew him. He
was a real neighbor being always
ready to respond to the call of those
needing help. The Methodist church
numbered him as an active member,
a faithful worker and a generous
supporter for upwards of thirty-four
years. For almost twenty years he
was a beloved superintendent of
Sandusky Sunday school. He served
his township for several years as
reeve and councillor. All public
work which had for its object the
general good of the community re-
ceived his attention and support.

On Saturday afternoon his re-
mains were followed to Cheapside
church by a funeral procession num-
bering nearly 150 vehicles. The
service was conducted by his friend
and pastor Rev. R. Raiton. The
floral tributes were very numerous,
among them being a wreath from
the grandchildren, a spray from
the sons-in-law, a broken wheel
from "The Walker family" (bro-
thers and sisters), a wreath from
the teachers and scholars of San-
dusky Sunday school, sprays from
Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker, the
Culver family and Mr. Lottridge,
and a wreath from friends in Buf-
falo.

The pallbearers were Messrs. C. O.
Shoup, O. J. Beam, L. J. Beam, J.
Dougherty, J. Pond and W. J.
Bush. A large contingent of friends
were present from a distance;
among them being friends from
Buffalo, Hamilton, Dunnville, Hagers-
ville, Jarvis, South Cayuga,
Rainham and Rainham Centre.

National Missionary Plans

The Canadian council of the Lay-
men's Missionary movement, which
has the direction of the work
throughout the Dominion, has just
issued a statement as to its policy
and plans for the immediate future.

The policy was adopted and then
submitted to the different denomina-
tional committees and heartily en-
dorsed by them. The denominational
secretaries each agreed that the
best results come to their work
through the larger inter-denomina-
tional meetings, and will therefore
all co-operate in the campaign of
the fall and winter. This will in-

two days each, in every province of
the Dominion, so located that every
