## Stole Harness by System

Guelph, July 27.—William Smith,  
the man who made harness stealing  
a business, and whose operations  
extended into all parts of the pro-  
vince, was this morning sentenced  
to three years in Kingston peni-  
tentiary. The sentence was passed  
on three charges at Guelph and one  
at Grimsby, to which he pleaded  
guilty, and on another charge at  
the latter place upon which sus-  
pended sentence was given.

Judge Chadwick commented upon  
the ingenuity and deliberateness  
with which the thefts were commit-  
ted. His plan, it appears, was to  
start into the country with a small  
trunk on the hunt for work suppos-  
edly. He would then secure a lift  
until he reached the locality de-  
stroyed. The trunk would then be hid-  
den and a raid made to a nearby  
stable during the night. The trunk  
would be taken to a station by the  
assistance of some accommodating  
farmer and the harness shipped  
forward to Toronto for sale.
